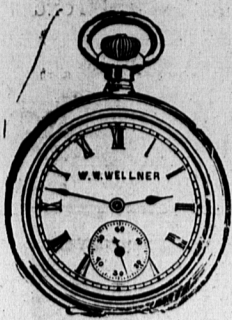

It is with feelings of regret that The Guardian chronicles the death of Joseph McQuaid, which took place at his mother's residence, Riverdale, Lot 30, on the morning of Thursday 10th inst, after an illness of several months. Deceased was an exemplary young man, beloved by all who knew him, and at the time of his death was only 27 years of age. Some two or three years ago he left home and until a few months before his death had been working in some of the New England States. Meetings are being announced in the different Cities of the United States to aid the destitute in Ireland and the Highlands of Scotland. The 14th Regiment under command of Capt Dwyer and Lieut Trevor at the garrison here contributed each one day's pay for the famine sufferers in these places.

Reports of the House of Assembly in session at this date contain the information that the chief subjects before the house were "The law preventing the export of oysters", and its being allowed to expire.
