Surveyor Gen'l Tells Of Mapping Half A Continent

F. H. PETERS, OF OTTAWA, GIVES INTERESTING INTERVIEW HERE—TELLS OF THE TREMENDOUS UNDERTAKING
 MONCTON, Nov. 25.—"The mapping of half a continent is a tremendous undertaking, requiring the utilization of all the resources of the science of surveying and mapping," stated Mr. F. H. Peters, M. E. I. C., M.A., Soc., C.E., Surveyor General, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, in an interview last evening.

In a country the size of Canada with its tremendous expanses undergoing a process of development such as it is, the question of how and where such development is to take place is one which is ever before the people. The process might be likened to that of improving a huge estate in which such improvements must take place contemporaneously in various parts of it.

In the process of development it has been found that the work is immeasurably facilitated by the use of accurate maps. The production of these maps is an undertaking of a high technical order and it is one of the problems of the Federal Department of the Interior working through its branches, notably the Topographical Survey of Canada. The need for these accurate maps is very urgent and in trying to meet this need the difficulties inherent in a country like Canada of small population and vast expanses are encountered.

To meet the situation the Topographical Survey has made it its business to study the problems before it thoroughly with the result that methods have been worked out which fulfill the purpose in hand most satisfactorily, considering the conditions under which they may be carried on. Among such important methods the new science of mapping by the use of aerial photographs takes a corresponding place. Annually the work undertaken by this organization is appraised and reported in the various provinces. It may be understood that in a huge undertaking such as this the best results are obtained if it is carried on upon an organized basis.

In organizing the work of producing topographic maps of the entire country a most ingenious system has been evolved whereby the country is

Boarding Homes

 stated that she believed that Charlottetown had the tools to work with, but had an insufficient number of workers. The child's right is the right to live its own life. Contributions to the world must be made through the lives of the individual. The carrying out of the work is not always done at the proper time. Lack of knowledge of the authority of the Children's Aid Society is evident among many of the parents of destitute children.

In all provinces except P. E. I. and N. B. the Children's Aid Society is supported by the payment of the expenses of each ward by the city. The lack of funds should in no case be allowed to hamper the work.

Another suggestion which Miss Anstey offered was that the parents be compelled to pay the expenses of supporting the children who have been removed from their care. If there is any chance of a child remaining in the home to good advantage the family tie should not be broken; otherwise the tie should be broken absolutely.

It would be much better for the child if it could be brought into a private home. Miss Anstey thought, rather than be placed in an institution permanently. In New Brunswick the boarding home method is being attempted. In the institution the home touch is lacking and it is difficult to develop initiative and independence. Miss Anstey gave examples to prove her point, and stated that she believed the institution should be used chiefly for the problem child. The boarding home plan might be a valuable project for the local society to attempt.

Presidential Address

In his presidential address Dr. McMillan remarked that as this is the twenty first annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society the organization has now reached its majority. Among the men most faithful to the work in the past were: Rev. Dr. Fullerton, Canon Simpson, Dr. Conroy, Alex. MacDonald, Councillor Smith, late W. L. Cotton. These men have left a monument of good work done. The necessity for the work has increased many times in the last twenty years. Conditions of the last ten years are infinitely worse than were the conditions of ten years previous. A fact attributed to a variety of causes. When the moral conditions of society are bad children are bound to suffer. Dr. McMillan stated. The promotion of a society such as this is one way of helping. The members of the Society are voluntary agents. If conditions in the next twenty five years are to be bettered it will be necessary to deal with the children. There is a tendency to petty crimes, truancy and delinquency among the children of today. That a child has been before the Stipendiary Magistrate and has received a warning may make the child feel a hero. It was due to the instrumentality of this society that a proper act was put in the statute books of the province dealing with illegitimacy.
