Henry Clutkey was right to the forefront with the Sullivan and Mahoney racing stable at Topsham, Maine, fair last week. The four-year-old pacer Dusty Hanover, in winning the Free for All, stepped the third heat in 2.03, which was not only a track record but the fastest third heat ever raced by a four-year-old over a half-mile track.

That sparkling mile came after a mile in the previous heat of 2.04. Writers commented upon the condition of the entire stable, giving praise not only to the trainer but to the care-takers and to the care-takers and they will winter at Rockland, Maine.

Lovely Lady 2.07 lowered the world record for two-year-old trotting fillies over a half-mile track to 2.07 3-4 at Shelbyville, Indiana, last week.

Greyhound 1.55 1-4, world's champion trotter, is at Indianapolis, while the pacing king Elly Direct 1.55 is being eased off at Syracuse, N. Y. The trotting queen Rosalind 1.56 3-4 a mark that places her in a tie as the world's second fastest trotter, two sales at the former champion Peter Manning, is still at Lexington, Kentucky.

November will be the month of harness horse auction sales. There will be one at Topsham, Mass., the first week in November, two sales at Indianapolis, Indiana, a sale at Springfield, Illinois, November 11th, and finally the Old Glory at New York the last week in November. Hundreds of trotters and pacers will change hands in these venues. There is said to be considerable demand from Europe for fast record trotters.

Bluenose And Thebaud To Resume Much-postponed Racing Series Tomorrow

GLoucester, Mass., Oct. 21—(AP)—Competition for the sailing championship of the North Atlantic which has been bogged down by the calm weather, protests and disputes, is expected to be resumed here Sunday morning at 11:05 A. M. AST.

Captain Angus Walters, skipper of the Canadian champion Bluenose from Nova Scotia, said he had received such information from Captain Charles Lyons, chairman of the race committee, but Captain Cecil Moulton, who has replaced Captain Ben Pine, sent ashore by illness, at the wheel of the American challenger, the schooner Gertrude L. Thebaud, said he had received no order whatsoever.

The contenders are credited with one victory each in a three-of-five series which began Oct. 9. Bluenose, holder of the International Fishermen's Trophy, donated by Senator W. H. Dennis, publisher of the Halifax Herald, spent the day hauled out on a marine railway, where she was taken after her skipper expressed fears she had been damaged in contact with a submarine obstruction in the harbor. When her sleek hull emerged from the water, damage was found to be negligible. Only a slight splintering of the shoe of her keel was revealed.

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Nemis And Binns Wind Up Training For Title Bout

With everything pointing to a gruelling 12-round bout, Bennie Binns and Johnny Nemis wind up training for their middleweight championship bout which takes place at the Sporting Club tonight. Both fighters were in superior form as they went through their final exercises and each, although expecting the toughest type of fight, were in excellent condition of being returned to the victor.

Nemis, the defending champion in tonight's encounter, arrived in the city on Thursday night and last night shadow boxed and punched both the light and heavy bags in winding up training. Principal in his 18th year in a career that spans 12 years ago, Nemis now is a veteran at 35 and still displays the same solid punching prowess that gave him his present title after a knock-out in 1921 when he defeated Irvine in Saint John, N. B. Since that time none have been able to take the crown away from him and he has never been defeated in a fight. Speaking of a previous fight with Binns Johnny plainly stated that although he was returned the winner at the time never heless Binns gave him the toughest battle he has had since he started on the comeback trail 2 years ago after being in retirement for three years and tonight he is expecting an even stiffer battle. Nemis expects to weigh in at 151 lbs.
