COLUMBUS, O. May 24—The Presby. Gen. Assembly today approved the report of the special committee on marriages and divorces, and adopted resolutions representing the hope of more radical reform, reaffirming utterances of former assemblies regarding divorce and enjoining Presbyterians to enforce the standard of the Church, to hold to a strict account all ministers under their care, and to urge upon all ministers, that they should refrain from giving the sanction of our Church, to the members of another Church, whose marriage is in violation of the laws of the Church whose communion they have chosen.

Owing to the Longshoremen's strike, the steamer Halifax did not arrive from Halifax to Charlottetown yesterday. She left up at the wharf. The agent Mr. Chipman offered the men the additional five cents per hour to unload her, but they wanted an agreement to the effect that the increase would be continued. This was refused and three men are unloading the perishable portion of the cargo. There are not many steamers in port just now, and few are expected. It is generally recognized that the men selected the wrong time to strike.

The killing of George Poole, a native of Prince Edward Island, by his son Howard, in defence of his mother, in January last was brought up in the probate court, at Taunton, Mass., on May 25th, when the admission of his will was contested by his daughters, Mrs. Ethel Lemaire of Lunenburg and Mrs. Maude Lemaire of this city, who were by the terms cut off with \$5 each. Mrs. Poole testified that her husband's skull was fractured by an accident in October, 1906, and after his recovery he changed greatly. He complained of worms in his ear and his feet, and did not want the windows opened because the bugs and worms would come in. He shut himself in his room and accused his eldest girl, who had been his favorite. Similar testimony was given by the two daughters, Mrs. Ethel Lemaire stated that after her father's accident he complained that he couldn't smell anything. Once he grabbed her mother by the throat. Mrs. Maude Lemaire said that her father would invite people to visit him and would then go to bed and forget about them. Mrs. Poole said she signed the will because she was afraid. Judge Fuller took the matter under advisement.

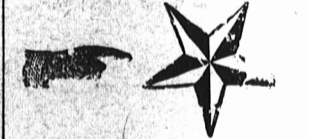
