The many friends and relatives will bear with sorrow of the death, at the early age of 19 years of Edith Rebecca Murray of Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 10th, 1907, she with her sister Annie Blanche, left for the United States, to take up the study of a trained nurse. They procured positions in the State Hospital, in Taunton, Mass. On Dec. 10th, 1908, they were both stricken down with that dread disease typhoid fever. They had every care, that experienced medical skill and attentive nursing could bestow. At one stage of their sickness Annie's life was despaired of, and she was removed to another room, lest her death, would disturb Edith, but later advised to port, Annie as slightly improved. At six o'clock on Jan. 10th, Edith died, while living with her aunts, Mrs. B. H. Smith, and Mrs. Bessie Allen. Her remains were accompanied home by her Uncle Lemuel Murray, who did everything he possibly could for her while living, by visiting her and sending a specialist from Boston, to consult with their own doctor. When the train arrived at Fredericton station a large number of neighbors and friends wended their way to the home of the sorrowing and almost broken-hearted widowed mother. The Rev. had died eight years ago. The Rev. Henry Pierce, her former pastor, conducted the funeral services at the house and grave. Edith was loved and respected by all her acquaintances. Her sister nurses placed a beautiful wreath on her casket and the flag of the Institution was lowered to half mast while her remains were in the State.
