ARCTIC ICE MOVES SLOW.—An unusually heavy field of drifted ice is passing through the Gulf of St. Lawrence and slowly moving seaward through the Cabot Strait says the Sydney Post. The prevailing high winds are of sufficient force to starve the floes moving where they are jammed on the coast.

CONCESSION TO FARMERS.—The orders issued by the Registrar at Charlottetown to men of ages 20 to 42 inclusive to report for duty or duty of honor between the 7th and the 24th of May, have been cancelled on account of quarantine at the Armories. As intimated by General Mewburn men from the urban districts were called before those on the farms. Under the extension granted no men will be called before June 1st and then only in parties as required, beginning with those in the urban centres, the giving those on farms a longer time for their Spring work.

FEED POTATOES TO THE STOCK.—An Ottawa despatch of May 7th says: "We will investigate the matter immediately," said Mr. Baxter of the Canada Food Board, when a Peterboro despatch saying that a farmer would feed his potatoes to hogs rather than sell them at the prevailing prices was read to him. "Can you give me the name of the person who sent the information so that we can wire the Peterboro police to look into it?" he asked. Mr. Baxter said that in Prince Edward Island the farmer was feeding potatoes to stock because the roads were impassable and they could not get the potatoes to market. "The Prince Edward Island farmers can't do anything else with their potatoes but the conditions do not exist in Peterboro," he said.

A NEW EGG PACK.—The safe delivery of eggs is being through the post will be ensured and their period of freshness prolonged at the same time by the use of a new system which has recently been presented and is now being called to the attention of egg dealers and shippers, says the Scientific American. The machine wraps the eggs in a long strip of paper, the egg being entirely covered by the paper which is twisted about them, making them resemble a long sausage more than anything else. The paper in which they have been enclosed has been dampened, and in this condition the eggs are craped round a collapsible wire frame. As the paper dries it becomes taut, and the eggs are securely held between the arms of the frame. When they are placed in a box for shipment they are supported so that they cannot come in contact with each other or the box and they are thus enabled to withstand a rough experience which would be disastrous under ordinary conditions. The frames are made in one dozen and crate sizes.

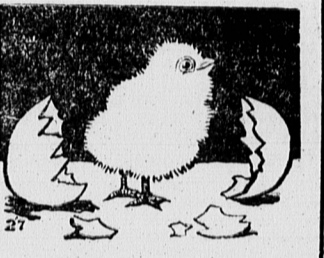

HUNS POISONING THEIR OWN PEOPLE GENEVA, May 9.—The municipal authorities at Mulhausen, Alsace, have ordered all inhabitants to procure gas masks before May 10 as protection "against aerial gas attacks" the Lusanne Gazette says it learns. "The truth of the matter is, the newspaper adds, that owing to the contrary wind large quantities of poison gas employed by the governments are drifting gradually towards towns along the Rhine which already is feeling the effects of the gas.
