Shortly before the bell, Roddie connected and Wilson was sent flat on his back. He arose wobbly at nine and clinched. Roddie sent him down again but was too anxious to end it and the bell saved Wilson. The Bostonian hung on to the end of the bout and saved himself from a knockout. This bout gave Roddie great publicity in the United States and he left here to try his ability in U.S.A. rings. He did well and defeated some of the best middleweights in the game.

JEALOUS OF SUCCESS

McDonald won so many bouts that his record became enviable. The gamblers went in search of men to beat him but Roddie kept on top. Untutored in the fine points of the ring game, McDonald boxed his own system and style—the style of the strong arm of John L. Sullivan. He seldom had to land his famous right more than once to stop an opponent. When a rival took Roddie's right on the jaw the customers quickly left the building as it was always the end of a bout.
