At a meeting of the council of the Montreal Board of Trade on Wednesday, the secretary reported he had ascertained that the Bankers' Association had decided, as asked by this council, to take action towards endeavoring to procure the disallowance of the Prince Edward Island's legislature known as "The Evidence Act," whereunder creditors cannot collect in the course of their business in that province amounts of claims for goods sold, unless the traveller who sold them had a license to do so. The council expressed satisfaction at the bankers' action, and ordered that the governor general in council be petitioned in behalf of the board to disallow that legislation. St. John Sun.
