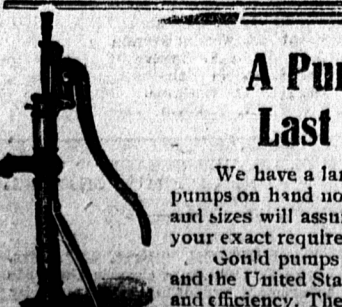

ATTRACTIONS AT EXHIBITIONS.

Some surprise has been expressed at the emphasis placed upon the attractions, other than purely agricultural and industrial, at our provincial and county exhibitions.

It is argued, in some quarters at least, that as the purpose of the exhibition is to educate along agricultural and industrial lines, this purpose should be rigidly ashered to, to the exclusion of everything else.

Hundreds of people attend our exhibitions and seed fairs for the sole purpose of gaining information. Hundreds of farmers attend simply to see what their neighbors have been doing along lines which they themselves have been following and with the very laudable purpose of finding out the methods by which the best can be produced.

THE POULTRY BUSINESS

The Dominion Government has now in Prince Edward Island an expert on poultry. The intention is not, we take it, to encourage the raising of fancy breeds or to establish a few fanciers in business but simply to promote the general poultry business of the province.

The hen is a small animal, worth probably from fifty to seventy-five cents each according to family history and general reputation. Taken in the aggregate and as a provincial asset she bulks large, very large, and her product comprises very favorably in value with that of any of our more pretentious products.

Probably every farmer's wife in the province owns a flock of hens and will smile at the idea of any mere man coming from Ontario to teach her how to raise them, how to feed them, how to market her eggs.

The poultry business can be similarly developed. There are some few who understand the business thoroughly, who can go to the exhibitions in our sister provinces and bring home the prizes. But the great majority of our farmers, or even of their wives, have very much yet to learn which when learned will be a source of wealth to the province.

While people are so willing to be wholesomely amused—so unwilling to do without it—the only reasonable thing to do is to provide the amusement and to keep it within reasonable bounds.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in St. James Hall, Charlottetown, on Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and twelve years, at twelve o'clock noon, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator pro tempore, Mr. John Hawley, besides whom were present Messrs T. F. Fullerton, W. H. Spencer, John Murray, A. Craige, ministers, and R. Munn, elder.

The matter of re-adjusting of congregations with regard to the regulations of the General Assembly as to the new minimum stipend of nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) was considered. (See Regulations of the Augmentation Fund, 1912, sections one and two, as follows:—(1) Augmented congregations must give a stipend of not less than \$600.00 per annum, and houses, being paid by the congregation, or \$50.00 additional in lieu of

name or house. (2) They must also contribute to stipend at an average rate of not less than \$5.50 per communicant, or \$10.00 per family belonging to the congregation where the number of communicants is greatly in excess or proportionately lower than the number of families.)

It was found that Cavendish congregation does not qualify for augmentation under section two. It was decided, on motion, to apply to the augmentation fund committee on behalf of the congregation of Dunlop and Murray Harbor North, for a grant of one hundred dollars (100.00) each for year ending February-twenty-eight, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

In regard to Georgetown it was agreed that as the minister there does not require to keep a horse no grant be applied for.

On motion Presbytery decided to apply in behalf of Marshfield for a grant of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00); and in behalf of West River for a grant of three hundred dollars (\$300.00), payable on condition that the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) extra is paid by the congregation for the current year.

Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed to support the last two applications before the augmentation fund committee.

It is disastrous to make temperance a party question unless the issue is clear and the decision of temperance people approximates unanimity. At least there would be nothing gained and much lost by calling for a decision before the eve of the next election and the judgment then is likely to be more just and more unanimous than it could be now, in the mean-
