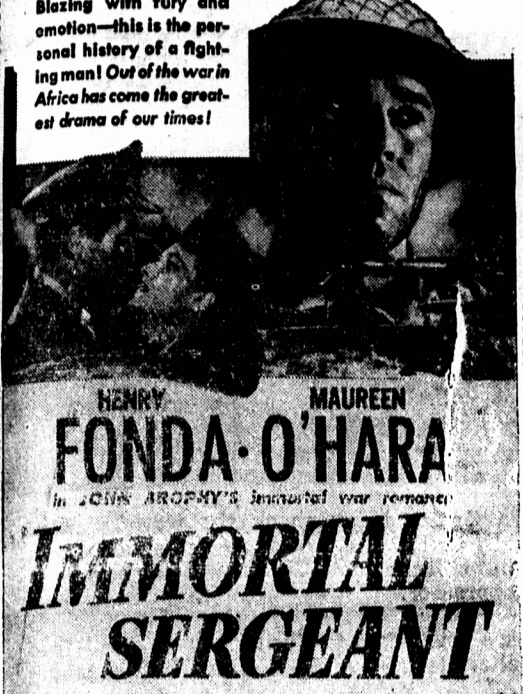

Nazi Hit-Run Raids Causing Some Concern

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, June 9.—(CP)—Let no one think these day-by-day spring forays by Germany's hit-and-run fighter-bombers which are leaving Britain's coastal towns sorrowing and scarred are not causing concern among those charged with the country's defence. Speaking in the House of Commons the air under-secretary gave assurance that new methods of countering enemy air attack of all kinds are constantly being studied, especially against the hit-and-run raider, a more complicated and troublesome business, as anybody living on the coastal target towns knows.

It was not, it can be taken for granted that fighter command, armed now with such fast machines as the new Spitfires, Whirlwinds and Hurricanes would have settled in long ago, completely. As it is 16 per cent of the fighter-bombers who attack coastal sectors fail to return home. Those that reach populated places drop their bombs wherever they are likely to cause disruption of routine living and loss of life then race quickly to the sea.

Root of the present defence problem is the high speed of the attackers which makes it difficult for interceptors or Typhoons to intercept the FW190s on their way to the target. The FW190 in level flight has a top speed in the neighborhood of some 370 miles an hour, a little less than Britain's top interceptors. Observers say it would only please the allies if the British could intercept aircraft defences at every place where the raiders are likely to visit rather than to attempt to search for and destroy them before they can drop their bombs. That such a course would be to the Nazis' liking is shown by the tactics of visiting the coast in the hope of dispersing British defences or compelling Britain to divert aircraft output to purely defensive weapons.

Experts say meantime to the people of the coastal towns that they must remain of good heart which they are as interceptors tactics and new anti-aircraft procedure are carried out and the bomber offensive against Germany continues.
