NE NEGOTIATIONS SAID TO BE AT STANDSTILL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(CP)—Negotiations on long-awaited United Kingdom-United States reciprocal trade agreement were reliably reported today to have come to a standstill because of dissatisfaction with concessions offered by the British Government.

French forces defending the island foreign settlement, Shantien, were rushing their own barricades to completion.

The Japanese reports indicated the advance column was making defeat at the hands of the numerically superior Kwangtung provincial troops by its rapid "back door" coastal advance.

These advices said the column had side-stepped Chinese forces arrayed near Tsungia, 30 miles east of Canton and was expecting to strike a lightning blow at the primary defences of the city by a drive down the Tsungia highway.

Such a fast advance the Japanese exposed their flanks to Chinese attack. Chinese military authorities denied the Japanese claims of rapid strides toward Canton, insisting that Tsengshing, which the Japanese said was taken yesterday, and Shekung, which the Japanese said they had entered on the same day, were still in Chinese hands.

If the Japanese advices were true, the mechanized force driving southward from Tsungia had gone about 90 miles since Japanese ransports landed in south China expeditionary force at Bias Bay eight days ago.

SHIANGHAI, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Japanese military authorities announced today that a flying column, intent on severing the Hankow-Canton railway south of the Chinese military capital, Hankow, was 25 miles east of its goal.

These advices placed the force at Shikow, roughly halfway between Sienning, on the railway about 50 miles south of Hankow, and Yangshing, which fell to the Japanese on Tuesday.

Today's military reports disclosed that the Japanese last Tuesday made a premature claim of victory in capturing a series of nearly three months of bitter fighting on the left flank of the Japanese Yangtze Valley campaign against Hankow.
