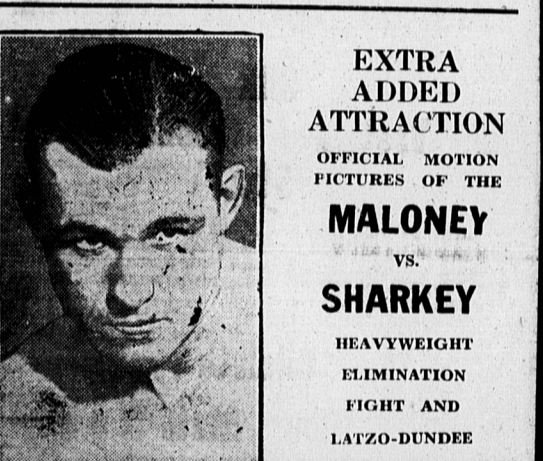

Maritime Golf Championship Meet

(Canadian Press.) WOODSTOCK, N. B., July 28. — Yesterday afternoon's play in the Maritime provinces Golf Association championship play in the way of results. The second round in the championship division saw the downfall of two of Woodstock's hopes, P. M. Marsten defeated by T. A. McAvity, of St. John and B. E. Marsten defeated by F. R. Rister, Fredericton 2 and 1. At one point in the last named match Marsten was 5 down. Probably the match between W. D. McNaughton, Moncton, and C. J. Jones, Woodstock, furnished the biggest thrill of the day. Jones was 4 down finishing the first nine, but staged a remarkable comeback and the players teed off for the 18th all square. Both had good drives, McNaughton's a little to the left, and both played their approach shots on the green. McNaughton on the edge for a 15 foot putt, and Jones near the centre about eight feet from the pin. The gallery watching the play held their breath. It was Woodstock's only chance for an entry in the semi-finals both missed their first putts, McNaughton missing his second by a fraction of an inch and a sigh of relief went up from the spectators as Jones sunk his for a w'n 1 up.

A regrettable incident of the meet was the inability of F. M. Meikle, Halifax, a former champion, to continue playing in the consolation. Acute bronchitis forced this sterling player to give up after turning in a card of 160 in the qualifying round. Of the four players remaining in the semi-finals for the championship G. P. HEAT WAVE GRIPS WEST

WINNIPEG, Man., July 28. — Winnipeg and the West was visited by an extreme heat wave on Sunday. In Winnipeg temperatures of 90 were reached and there was not a breath of wind. Several prostration cases were treated at the hospitals but no deaths occurred in the city. The heat wave was more severely felt because up to the present the summer has been cold and the people were unprepared for the sudden baking. The beaches, and resorts near the city were thronged by thousands.

N. Y. Sportsman Will Erect Huge Stadium In Montreal

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Que., July 28. — The Montreal Daily Star in its sports column today says that Carlos Ferrar, Rochester, N. Y., sportsman, will erect a \$500,000 stadium at Montreal and that the stadium next year will be the home of a team of the international league. According to the Star Mr. Ferrar, who is at present in Montreal, said building operations would start in October and would embrace 10 acres at the corner of Iberville and Masson Streets in the Rosemount section of the city. "Our stadium will seat 31,000 people, and arrangements have been made to cover it over in winter, making a winter stadium greater than Madison Square Gardens. This is being done because we don't want our large investment to be idle in winter time. "The seating capacity will be \$10,000 in excess of any minor league ball park in the world," concluded Mr. Ferrar.

Interesting Complication of the First Section of the City Baseball League—Hoyt and Bolger leading batsmen.

The following interesting figures season, his timely hitting with compiled by Mr. Charles Stewart, official scorer of the City Baseball League not only makes interesting reading for the large following of baseball fans but gives each and every follower of the game an idea of the progress made by the individual players also the total batting averages of the three teams. The figures are for the first half of the League (nine games) and shows that Jack Hoyt of the Anchors and one of the cleverest ball players seen around here in a long time is leading the batting pack with a splendid average of .412. "Young" Bolger, Star outfielder and still in his teens ranks second with a most surprising average of .381. This lad only broke into senior company last year and is one of the stars of the League. His hitting throughout the season has been remarkable, and furthermore he has a goose egg opposite his name in the error column. To go through the first section without an error is a feat that only a few players can boast of. He has eight stolen bases to his credit. Percy McQuaid, last year's base stealing champion, has ten, while Eddie McGulgan appears in the same category. "Tucker" Ryan although one of the biggest offenders in the League in errors, ranks fourth in batting with an average of .346. Stan has the great impetus it enjoys in this city and Province today.
