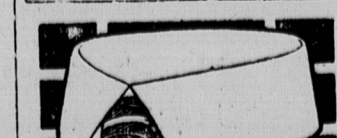

Gallant Young Officer Killed

Lieutenant Struan Robertson of Picton, Presumed to Have Fallen in the Battle of Picardy

Many friends of Lieut. Col. Struan Robertson and Mrs. Robertson, of Picton, heard with deep regret of the loss of their only son, Lieutenant Struan Robertson, whose death in action in France was announced on Wednesday, Lieut. Robertson, accompanied his mother to England some three years ago whither she went to join her husband, but he returned to Nova Scotia some months later to resume his studies at Picton Academy where he had won high distinction as a brilliant student. He was however eager to do his part in the great war and he entered the Royal Military College at Kingston to qualify as an officer. On completion of his course he received a commission in the Royal Artillery and he sailed for England in August last to enter the Imperial service. As the usual training period in England extends over several months it is believed that he crossed to France quite recently and fell on the Field of Honor in the Battle of Picardy where the Artillery usually with the Infantry have won imperishable renown. Lieut. Robertson had only reached his twentieth year and had before him a career of the promise there will be many who will sympathize with Col. and Mrs. Robertson in the loss of a gallant young soldier and a worthy son.
