Lively Debate Features Query On Prohibition

Debate, Subsequently Ruled Out Of Order, Elicits Strong Comeback From Government Bench In Reply To Opposition Criticism—Progress Made On Insurance Act In Committee.

Mr. Campbell replied that he had been misreported; that his reference had been to prominent speakers in Summerside and his information was that only one raid had been made on them since January 1st.

Hon. Mr. LePage asked if the Dominion Government would pay for the three extra men. Personally he considered there were sufficient men employed now. In any event the Province was paying enough now.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan said there would be no increased cost to the Province. It would continue to pay \$15,000 a year under the agreement. That was a very favorable arrangement inasmuch as the operation of the R. C. M. P. in this Province costs between \$60,000 and \$75,000. "We have therefore made a very good bargain," he declared.
