PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND EXPORTS TO THE STATES.

The Guardian stated the other day that we had learned on what appeared to be good authority that the exports from Prince Edward Island to the States have about doubled within a year past.

For instance, we shipped in 1910, 3 bush. oats; double this and you have 6 bushels. We shipped 37 tons hay, double this and you have 74 tons. We shipped no swine, no sheep, no beef, no wheat, no barley, and no green fruit.

Mainly but not quite accurately Mr. Tanton has followed a statement submitted by Hon. Mr. Patterson in the House of Commons on April 10 showing the dutiable exports by Provinces to the United States in 1910.

Unfortunately the ordinary Canadian trade returns as published do not give the quantities and values of the exports from the different Provinces as was done in the special statement of Hon. Mr. Patterson above referred to.

Now the American consular reports for the calendar year 1910 as published show the exports from Prince Edward Island to the United States to have been \$225,668.36. We are credibly informed that the exports this year (between 1st January and Aug. 21, (the date of The Guardian's statement) from the port of Charlottetown alone to the United States had increased by over \$100,000.

Not only is there a difference between the party disputants as opposed to each other, but there is considerable discrepancy between the different statements of the advocates on either side in regard to these matters.

The Patriot tells that at a caucus of the Provincial Liberal party held in this city on Tuesday it was decided that the Legislature shall be dissolved and a general election held during the current year.

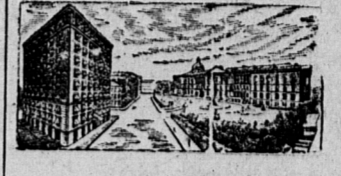

From Guardian August 9th A COMMON-SENSE VIEW.

It is the common fault of party advocates both in the press and on the platform, especially at election times that they express extreme views. The discussion of reciprocity affords an instance of this. Reciprocity may, and we believe it will prove a very good thing for Prince Edward Island, without immediately making every one rich. It may in some minor respects prove detrimental to individual interests and yet on the whole prove beneficial. Its essential feature is that it removes some serious obstacles to trade and leaves our people much more free than they have been as to their choice of markets in which to sell and buy.

The so-called "protection" which it was claimed the national policy gave to the farmer, reciprocity takes away by giving practical free trade in farm products. But we are of those who believe that this so-called protection to the farmer was a sham and never of any practical benefit to him. As to the benefit to our farmers from the removal of United States duties on our farm products, it would be rash to assume that the amount of the duty will all be added to the price which our farmers will receive. If that were true the American consumer would receive no benefit. The instances are few in which the consumer does not pay a large share of the duty, and hence he would be expected to gain by the removal of the duty.

The inevitable effect of the removal of duties from farm products by the United States and Canada will be to equalize prices on both sides of the boundary. The American market being the larger in the proportion of ten to one, will be the dominating factor in that regard. It is in the main a higher market than that of Canada, but not in all things. We stand to gain if it remains a better market than our own, and The Guardian believes it will so remain. In the United States manufacturing is developing much faster than agricultural production. In Canada the reverse of this is true, notably in the Northwest. The trade agreement is neither better for being proposed by one party nor the worse for being opposed by the other party. It is none the worse as an agreement for us because the Americans refused to enter into it for forty years, and none the better because they greatly desire it now. The rapid growth of our trade with the States in the face of high duties affords the strongest proof of the natural and neighborly desire of the two peoples to do business with each other. The agreement merely removes certain artificial barriers and leaves the people free to do as they desire. And a willingness to trade with a next neighbor surely tends more to promote good feeling than would a refusal to trade. This seems to be a common-sense view of the trade agreement. 8-19tdrtf.

THE DISTURBANCE ARGUMENT.

Some stress has been laid on the point that if we enter into a trade agreement with the United States our tariff policy must thereafter become so interlocked with that of the Republic that we cannot get clear of the entanglement if we want to without creating disturbance and danger, both commercial and political. It must be clear to those who advance this argument that Sir John Macdonald had no such fears when he was an advocate of reciprocity, and put the reciprocity clause in his famous national policy. Reciprocity did not, in the Conservative chieftain's mind involve any danger of annexation in 1879. Why should it involve that danger now?

Again, Britain has from time to time made trade treaties with many of the nations of the earth, some of them great and powerful, others of less influence. When did ever a trade treaty involve Britain in danger? Never that we recall. Tariffs have often made trouble and disturbed trade. The repeal of the old reciprocity treaty in 1866 created far less disturbance to trade in Canada than did the Dingley and McKinley tariffs afterward. But Canada was not overwhelmed by these changes. On the contrary, the Dominion has been well able to hold her own in tariff wars, and has not hesitated on occasion to strike back at Uncle Sam with a "dumping clause," or at Germany with a surtax.

If we have thus held our own in tariff wars we ought to be able to hold our own under conditions of peace in trade matters such as reciprocity gives. We can reimpose the duties on farm products at any time if we want to do so, without any danger of creating political trouble, or any disturbance to our trade fairly comparable to what we have undergone in the past. The United States is not likely to terminate the trade agreement against our wishes, but if that should be done the disturbance would be no greater than if we terminated it ourselves. Hang it!
