MAYOR-ELECT HYLAN OF NEW YORK.

Judge Hylan New York's mayor elect, does not drink or smoke. He has no hobbies. He attends a baseball game occasionally, and a horse race now and then. He takes his recreation with his wife and daughter, Virginia, who is 21. In Winters he goes with his family to Palm Beach for a short stay. His summer vacations are spent either on his old farm in Greene County, at Saratoga, or in the Adirondacks. He is 49 years old. Not only was Judge John F. Hylan swept in to office by the largest plurality ever given to a mayoralty candidate in New York city, but there was elected with him the entire Democratic ticket, given the new administration all of the 16 votes in the Board of Estimate, which controls all city expenditures. Complete returns show that the Socialists elected seven members of the Board of Aldermen, a Municipal Court Judge and 10 members of the Assembly.

It is the first time in history that the Socialists have been represented in the Board of Aldermen and the election of a Municipal Court Judge also sets a precedent. The election of 10 Assembly men in a gain of eight the Socialists already having had two members in the Assembly.

MAJOR J. S. JENKINS N.W. LIEUT. COLONEL

Corp. W. Warren Myers, No. 23172, B. Coy., Lewis Section 4th Batt. B.E.F., is one of the original firsts. He was instructed in machine gunnery with Major P. B. McRae. He has been in France now for over two and one half years. He was officially reported by the Officer in charge of Records Ottawa, on June 28th, 1916, as wounded and admitted to No. 3 Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, France. He recovered and went back to his work at the front, where he has been ever since. Corp. Myers is a Mt. Albion boy, the son of Mrs. Margaret Myers, and like many more of the Mt. Albion boys was not afraid to don the khaki and fight for King and Country. His brother, John H. Myers, is also in France with the No. 8 Siege Battery. The above photograph was taken during his last furlough. In his letters home, while not complaining of the hardships of war, he strongly urges that immediate reinforcements from Canada be needed to enable the Canadian army to remain in the war till the end and to help bring the war to a glorious ending.

A special cable to the Toronto Mail and Empire from London says: "Among the officers who have sailed to Canada on either short leave or duty are Colonel L. McCombe of Ottawa, assistant medical director of the London area; Colonel C. L. Starr, of Toronto who has been orthopaedic surgeon at Ramsgate Hospital, Colonel J. L. Potter, acting director at Ottawa who has been visiting England. Major J. S. Jenkins, who is attached to the medical headquarters in London, appears in the orders today as a Lieut. Colonel. Major Jenkins is a McGill man and is the son of Lieut. Col. S. R. Jenkins of Charlottetown. He has taken over the duties of Major Macphail.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN MCKENZIE.

On November 1st, 1917, at North Wiltshire, Prince Edward Island, Mr. John McKenzie departed this life at the advanced age of ninety-eight years, on the following Saturday. November the third his body was laid to rest in the Hartsville Presbyterian cemetery by the side of his wife (Annie McLean) who predeceased him twenty-one years ago. The late Mr. McKenzie was born in Inverness-shire Scotland on May the second, 1819, and came to this Province in 1840. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, and had a strong attachment to the Sanctuary. So long as his health permitted he was regular in his attendance and often walked from his home to church, a distance of five miles. JAMES H. DINGWELL.

In the death of James H. Dingwell, which occurred on Friday, November 2nd in the eighty-fourth year of his age, Bay Fortune has lost one of its oldest, most beloved and respected citizens.

The late Mr. Dingwell had been in ill health for some months, the weariness of which he bore with the calmness and patience and Christian fortitude which had characterized his whole life. He was the son of Hon. William Dingwell, who began shipbuilding in his youth at Bay Fortune, where he built up an extensive business and was accounted one of the best shipbuilders of his day. He drafted his own plans and prepared his own models, building ships of from two hundred to two hundred and fifty tons. He was elected to the Provincial Legislature and served for sixteen years as a representative of King's County.

James H., the subject of this sketch was one of eight children. He settled on the old family homestead and became one of Bay Fortune's successful and progressive farmers. He was not only a progressive farmer but a man of courage and initiative in connection with other ventures. This was particularly manifest in relation to undertakings, such as the lobster packing factory he started, and the purchase of boats, sein, and complete equipment for shore seining of mackerel some years ago.

Material prosperity followed his efforts and ventures in all of these directions to a considerable degree. But better than any material prosperity was the moral esteem in which he was held by the entire community. The proof of such esteem was evident on the day of his funeral, Nov. 4th, when so large a gathering assembled at the home and followed in funeral procession his body to the Presbyterian Church, Bay Fortune, of which he was for many years an elder and where a crowded church composed of all creeds listened to a comforting impressive and inspiring service conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. MacKay.

Mr. Dingwell was an unassuming man but a man who unconsciously filled a vital place in the community life and the church life. His home through the co-operation of his helpful and kindly wife was one where friends were always welcome and from which the needy were never turned away empty handed. In brief, as his pastor said of him, he was a true, Christian gentleman.

He is survived by a sorrowing widow and seven sons, five of whom were at his bedside in the closing hours of his life.

King's County Dominion Election

Queen's County Dominion Election

To the Electors of Queens' County, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Six years ago Mr. A. A. McLean and myself were elected to represent you in the House of Commons. As the result of the election then held the Liberal-Conservative party came into power. During the years that have passed since then I have endeavored to the best of my ability to procure as large a portion as possible of governmental advantages for my native Province. The Government of the party I was elected to support, has done much for the betterment of our trade and commerce and our agricultural interests. It gave us the Car Ferry, increased grants to agriculture, the addition of \$100,000 annually to our provincial subsidy, secured for our Province four members for all time to come, built a number of wharves for the convenience of our farmers and shippers, also dredged the docks at Charlottetown and elsewhere.

When it is considered that for over three years of this period, the Dominion revenues have been urgently required for war purposes, I feel assured that our efforts are not unappreciated by the people of the Province, irrespective of party. I am convinced that what has been done will prove a lasting benefit to the Province and will afford a great impetus to our future prosperity.

During the last session of Parliament I was pleased to support Sir Robert Borden in his endeavors to unite the two great political parties which divide Canada in one Government. Such a consummation would insure a more vigorous prosecution of the war; and would be the means of raising with the least possible friction the necessary recruits to go to the assistance of our hard pressed brave boys at the front.

I am highly gratified that a Union Government has now been formed. It is composed of the strongest men of both parties and shall have my full support.

At the last session of Parliament an Act was passed establishing machinery for the holding of a Dominion election. It provided for the appointment of enumerators to make up lists of voters for all the polls. These will shortly be appointed. May I be permitted to request that every possible assistance be given the enumerators in the preparation of these lists, so that everyone in the County, entitled to a vote, shall have his or her name on the lists before polling day.

In thus giving an account of my Stewardship, permit me to state I shall be candidate for this County at the coming election.

The crisis which involves our Country is the most important in its history. It devolves upon everyone to consider well the issue raised: are the people of Canada to leave unsupported our brave boys at the Front, who have so long and so well fought for the preservation of our rights and liberties, and whose splendid deeds of heroism have covered Canada with glory and renown? It is impossible.

I respectfully ask for the votes of all true and loyal men and women of this large and intelligent County of Queens', assuring them that the best interests of our province and especially our soldiers shall have at all times my sincere support.
