Expect Ruthenia To Become Part Of Soviet Union

LOCHNER PARIS, Jan. 22 (AP) -- Soviet Russia, diplomatic quarters said here today, negotiated another important agreement with the planned road to security by obtaining the assurance of the government of President Eduard Benes that Ruthenia never will become the subject of a quarrel between the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia. This means that Ruthenia, also known as the Carpathian Ukraine, will become part of the Soviet Union. Soviet Ukraine which is being assembled from parts hitherto belonging to Russia, Poland and Czechoslovakia. Ignoring earlier denials of any readiness to yield Ruthenia, Czechoslovak statesmen now say they did not want Ruthenia in the first place at the end of the First World War in 1918 but that former President Thomas Masaryk goodheartedly incorporated it in the Czech state so the Ruthenians would not be compelled to resign Hungary or come under Polish domination. Secondly, they claim that Ruthenia always has been a great financial expense. A Czechoslovak informant explained that Russia in 1918 had no interest in Ruthenia since the region then had no common frontier with the Soviet Ukraine separated as it was by the Polish Western Ukraine. Now, however, the situation has changed completely. With the Polish Ukraine's incorporation in the Russian Ukraine, Ruthenia becomes strategically important to Premier Stalin. Premier Stalin is determined that Hungary never again shall become a threat to Russia such as she was in both wars. Ruthenia, though at present poor in railways and motor roads, can easily be developed by the Soviet Union into a formidable military bastion on Hungary's flank. At the first sign of any aggressiveness by the Magyars the Red Army could march from Ruthenia into Hungary. 1-24-11.

Newsman Views Paris In Light Of 1940 Memory

LOCHNER PARIS, Jan. 22 (AP) -- Returning to Paris and seeing its famed boulevards teeming again with military vehicles in reverse to those few foreign correspondents who like the foreign press men trucks into the fallen French Capital June 14, 1940. But what a difference! Then the streets and avenues were empty; now they teem with life. Then I counted exactly 11 persons at Paris' busiest spot, the famed Place Concorde. Normal life is in evidence there now except that there are only a few private cars and no taxis. Then 75 per cent of the inhabitants had fled before the blitzing enemy. Now they are back in their homes, even though hot water is rationed and electric current fails occasionally. Then Paris was a ghost city with the few residents remaining not daring to emerge from their homes. Now the streets are alive again. So much alive, in fact, that on driving into the city from the airport we saw men, women and children enjoying themselves on a merry-go-round despite the wintry cold. Back in 1940 nobody was in the mood for fun. By an ironic twist of fate, Allied war correspondents live at the same hotel where the Germans billeted us in 1940, but again what a change! Then surly French waiters served on command. White linen had disappeared and was cooked by indifferent if not hostile chefs. Now we enjoy excellent meals brought by smiling waiters. I again hear the familiar peacetime cries of newsmen, some 20-odd dailies. These are mere tabloids, one-sheet affairs, but at least they express diverging views. The Communist to the Conservative. Back in 1940 only collaborators, organs were tolerated by the Gestapo. In one alarming respect, however, the Paris of 1945 differs unfavorably from the Paris of 1940. The population distinctly bears the earmarks of malnutrition, of economic worry and of nervous disorders occasioned by the war. 1-24-11.

So. Africa Has Housing Shortage

JOHANNESBURG, Jan. 22 (CP Cable) -- South Africa, in common with other countries, has a housing shortage. Throughout the Union it is most acute and many Europeans in the large cities are forced to live in garages and other unsuitable accommodation without sanitary conveniences. Aggravating the situation is the fact that business premises also are insufficient to meet the demand and many flats are being used for tailoring, dressmaking and so forth. J. D. Briggs, chairman of the South African Labor party and of the Building Union's joint executive, with some justice, blamed local authorities for it. Even before the war, when money, materials and labor were plentiful, they failed to undertake adequate housing schemes for Europeans and natives. Now, however, the labor shortage is acute but building speculators have been erecting houses at exorbitant prices while essential housing for workers is held up. Indicative of the position is a new Government emergency measure providing that any person, compelled by business to be away from his home town for a period not exceeding six months, must be given the same boarding house or hotel on his return. Dr. E. J. Hurlin, Johannesburg's city engineer, who has just relinquished the post of Government housing director, said the position would be eased greatly if the Government guaranteed full employment to the building workers for 10 years while the war, thus attracting more artisans. 1-24-11.

Family Allowances Called Guarantee Against Depression

KITCHENER, ONT., Jan. 22 -- Hon. Brooke Claxton, minister of national health and welfare, tonight described the Federal Government's family allowance legislation as "one of our greatest guarantees against a possible depression." In an address prepared for delivery before the annual meeting of the North Waterloo Liberal Association, Mr. Claxton said that apart from the money that they would give Canada's children, family allowances also would be a "great means of distributing purchasing power to the people who need it every month." "Family allowances will enable them to live in better houses, to wear better clothes and to buy more things that Canada produces and grows and needs. A good proportion of the family allowance payments will go to the farmers across Canada. A good proportion will also go to industrial families across Canada. "The monthly distribution of money to Canadian families will be one of our greatest guarantees against depression." Mr. Claxton said Sir. William Beveridge, the British economist, has reported that a satisfactory scheme of social insurance can be put into effect without a general system of family allowances. "The main reason this was done was because wages were directly related to work and not the family of the wage earner.
