The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The usual reports from the teachers were submitted. The resignations of Miss Dutocher, Miss Bremner and R. E. Smith were accepted. A number of applications were read for positions in the City schools. Communications were received from the City Council and Executive Council notifying the Board of the re-appointments of the retiring Trustees namely Mr. Haudrahan and Dr. Taylor. The tenders for painting west Kent Street School were opened. That of Mr. Bourke's was accepted. After passing a number of bills the meeting adjourned.

It appears that for the past few years a number of both horses and cattle have died in the vicinity of Souris from a disease, the nature of which has so far been unexplained. John McLean reported the matter to the Commissioner of Agriculture who in turn notified the Dominion Department of Agriculture, and Dr. Pettibick was immediately instructed to investigate. He was in Souris last Monday and we understand held one or more post mortems. Dr. Pettibick refused to be interviewed stating that, for the present, his duty ended in reporting the matter to the Chief Veterinary Inspector at Ottawa.

EASTERN NOTES.—Occasional showers sometimes in one section of country, sometimes in another generally accompanied by the usual electric disturbances, are bringing the crops on fairly well though nothing to expect will produce a good crop of hay this season.—The cod fish season is wound up on the South Side, and it has been a fairly good one. The fishermen are now engaged in drying and marketing their fish to be ready for the mackerel and hake fishing which may begin anytime.—The farmers are beginning their usual campaign against the persevering potato bug.—Dominion Day passed off quietly. A party from the south side under the efficient guidance of James Leet visited the placid waters of North Lake, but their success in catching trout hardly came up to the average.—Freeman Kennedy and Miss Mulvina Stewart were married at the residence of the bride's father on the evening of the 30th inst., in the presence of a large number of guests. The death of Miss Flora Chapman occurred on the night of the 20th, inst.—Pasture is improving and milk is increasing at the factories but June will show a considerable shortage. The well groomed team of William Young takes in an immense load to the Red Point Factory every morning.—Daniel McDonald is using his artistic brush with good effect on the residence of Cyrus Kennedy.
