The Halifax Herald says: The Maritime championships at Charlottetown are attracting considerable attention. Halifax will not be represented by a large field, but will have a few athletes of the higher quality competing in different events. Fritz Schaefer, the Wanderers' sprinter, is going over for the 100 and 220 yards and he may also take part in the 440 yards. These events, at least, should result in points for Halifax. There is also talk that Blois Smith, another Wanderers' sprinter of promise, will also be among the starters. In the distance runs Palmer, of the Wanderers, who won the Dartmouth six mile race on Thursday last, will uphold the Wanderers' colors. Apart from these three, however, Halifax is doing little, and it is almost impossible for the Wanderers to win team honors with three men, good as they are.
