BRavery of BRITISH OFFICERS

A remarkable letter has been received from a sergeant of one of the Canadian units which left British Columbia, the greater part of which is devoted to a description of the gallant behavior of the British "aristocrat" officer while under fire. He confesses that when he left Canada he had nothing but the heart of contempt for the Englishman of social standing but that now all this is changed. From what he had seen of these gentlemen he has come to the conclusion that there could be no finer soldiers.

An extract of what he wrote follows:—"On our right was an Imperial regiment. The shelling was heavy, and we were all in the best cover we could get when up the trench came one of their officers, actually wearing a monocle and cane. He might have been out for a stroll on Piccadilly, for he walked as unconcerned as if he was bored to death by the monotony of life. 'Ah, sergeant,' he addressed me, 'see that you have a sentry on the communication trench; that is well. He understands his orders, does he?'"

"Yes, sir," I replied. I had stepped out of my cover, as it was impossible to crouch and talk to such a man, no matter how fast the shells were coming. I went on to state what the orders were, but it was difficult to make myself heard, so I finished.

"You know, sergeant," he questioned. I cannot hear a word you are saying for those wretched shells. I made myself heard at last, and he strode back into my funk-hole, and he strode off down the trench, expressing in his every movement that the whole affair was a beastly bore.

This war has made the British aristocrat solid with the people, at least until all of the millions of soldiers of this war are dead. Their wonderful grit, unrivalled coolness, and complete indifference to all dangers, has made them not only respected, but loved; there is no other word for it. My own views about them have completely changed. Surely they are a class apart; blue blood is more than a name. From all the world comes great fighting men, but their equal is not among them. They know no fear, neither can crash of doom make them start or change expression. Even here, under a rain of death, they are still bored."
