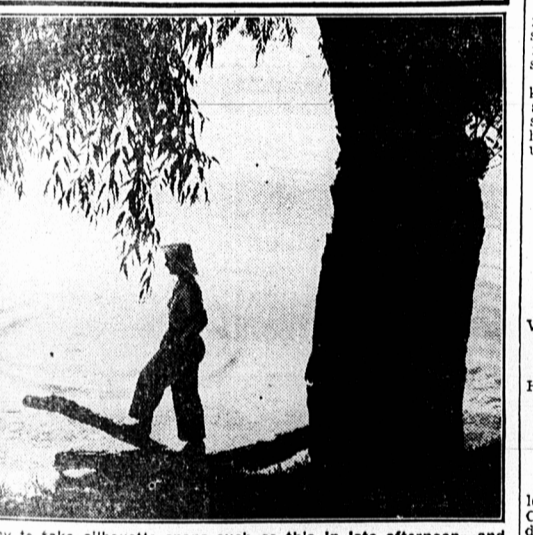

**HOT WATER PIPES NEED INSULATION**

Maintaining a sufficient supply of hot water for all domestic needs is a frequent problem for some owners whose hot water is dependent upon an automatic gas electric hot-water heater. All hot-water plumbing lines are made of iron pipe because of the amount of surface exposed compared to the amount of hot water carried. In order to minimize heat loss, hot-water tank should, if possible, be insulated.

easy to take silhouette snaps such as this in late afternoon—and they add interest to your album.

late afternoon, the full normal exposure would have been perhaps 1/25 second at f/8. In this case, the exposure was probably 1/100 second at f/11 or f/16. A snapshot exposure at this hour, using the second stop opening on a box camera, and average speed film, would also have been just about right for the silhouette effect.

The effect of underexposure, in these shots, is to "black out" shadow detail so that you get a good strong silhouette. Naturally, a subject such as a person should usually be posed in profile; then the outline of the features will show clearly.

In taking silhouette pictures, remember always to choose an hour when the sun is fairly low in the sky, have the sun squarely behind the subject or some object in the scene, and give less than normal exposure. Follow these rules, and you'll get good clear silhouette snaps that will add interest to your album.

Jack Atchinson and Steve Latouche, a pair of Winnipeggers, scored a goal apiece for Sydney, and Bill Hannon of Halifax got the other.

For North Sydney, the scorers were MacKinnon and The Williams of Charlottetown, Bill Sneider of Brandon, Man., and Jimmy Russell of Hamilton, Ont.

Sydney, which won the league opener against Glace Bay last night, came out of the first period with a 3-2 edge, added three in the second period and divided up four scores with the Northsiders in the final session. Four thousand attended.

## Children Can Absorb Only So Much Knowledge

Ottawa, Nov. 5—Children no matter who or what they are can absorb "only so much knowledge," according to W.D.T. Atkinson, principal of Glebe Collegiate.

And so Canadian and American school girls and boys can overcome hold up their heads despite the widely publicized story of the 11-year-old English school boy who ranks with United States boys of 17.

"Must Be Extraordinary"

"He must be extraordinary," Mr. Atkinson said of Alan Borne, of Derby, England, child genius of Katharine Burke, of Lynn, Mass., who although only 11 years old, was found to have the standing of the senior of high school according to Are lean curricula.

"We have more than a half doz. English child geniuses attending Glebe Collegiate and while they are all well up on their subjects, I haven't noticed any marked difference in their knowledge of the various subjects."

"Some of them have Latin as a strong subject but then they may be weak in mathematics or the sciences. It stands to reason if you concentrate a great deal of your time on one subject, other subjects are bound to suffer."

Our students are all girls except one, and they came to us from Falkirk and Glasgow, Scotland, and Brighton and Yelverton, England.

"It is certainly nice to have well-learned students. It is encouraging domestic production of all textile fibres."

## Senators Play 2-All Tie With Boston Bruins At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 5—(CP)—Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Senior League held Art Ross' Boston Bruins to a 2-2 tie tonight in an exhibition game played at Ottawa Auditorium.

At the 12 minute mark in the first period Mel Hill, assisted by Billy Cowley and Roy Conacher scored from a hard angle to put Bruins a goal ahead but six minutes later the Lemay Brothers teamed up and Tony drove the equalizer past goalie Frank Brimsek on a pass from Albert.

Senators went into the lead early in the second period when Jack Carthy took a pass from Eddie Powers and George Greece golfed it past Brimsek at the 1:37 mark.

Since it was an exhibition game, no overtime was played.

## "Most Valuable Player" Award To Greenberg

CHICAGO, Nov. 5—(AP)—Henry Greenberg, the American Baseball League's "most valuable player" for the second time in six years.

After seven years at first base for the Tigers, Greenberg moved to the outfield "for the good of the team" and experienced one of his brightest seasons, leading the league in home runs and runs batted in. He hit 41 homers and drove in 150 runs. He received the award first in 1936.

A 24-man committee, representing the Baseball Writers Association of America, gave the 29-year-old Greenberg 292 points in the annual poll for the award. Bob Feller, Cleveland's young pitcher, trailed the Tiger star with 222 points. Joe Dimaggio, New York star, was third with 151 points.

## Pusie Returns To Pacific Coast

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5—(CP)—Jean Pusie, fiery French-Canadian defenceman who left Vancouver Long in mid-season last year in a huff and was suspended from organized hockey, has been reinstated and is returning to the Pacific Coast League, it was announced today by the office of league president F. W. Taylor. The announcement did not say what team he will join on his return.
