Vagabond Slugger Signs With Cubs

CHICAGO, July 22.—(AP)—Baseball's vagabond slugger, Zeke Bonura, made a new stopover victory in his race-free, nomadic explorations on the league territory.

The big left baseman was purchased for \$10,000 by Chicago Cubs from Washington Senators. The Senators got him from Chicago White Sox, sold him to New York Giants and then got him back from the Giants over the bargain counter. Now Zeke is back in the National League and back in Chicago. It's Broadway "Zeke" with Zeke for it was here he broke in with the White Sox in 1934.

He's been ordered to report immediately to the Cubs, who have two first sackers—Phil Cavarretta and Glenn Russell—in the hospital, and who have had more than 600 men left on base this season. Of Zeke should help some. He's hit only 273 but has driven in 46 runs this season and has made 16 doubles, three triples and three home runs. His lifetime major league batting average is .313.

Ab Jenkins Topples Records In Motor Race

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, July 22.—(AP)—Ab Jenkins, Salt Lake City's fast-driving mayor, met the combined challenge of heat and time today, ploughing through the salt of the Utah desert flats at a rate which bettered world records with almost every turn of the 12 1/2-mile oval course.

As he neared the halfway point in his contemplated 24-hour run, he had surpassed 111 established marks—most of them his own. Jenkins exceeded his first former record within less than 20 minutes after his start at 5:38 a. m., MST, 9.38 a. m. A.D.T. That was the 50 kilometre mark, raised, unofficially, from 171.38 to 172.915 miles an hour.

From then until the first pit stop at 350 miles, the meteor's rate rose steadily, reaching an impressive 183.041 m.p.h. average for the 500 kilometre, nearly six miles better than the old 171.110. Not single intermediate record escaped nor did any of those for times and distances reached subsequent to the pit stop.

Greyhound Takes Victory In Straight Heats At Grand Circuit Race Meet

Reds Start 16-game Tour In Fine Shape

CINCINNATI, July 22.—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds, class of the National League whether Brooklyn likes it or not, started a critical 16-game eastern tour today in the best shape in history, enjoying their longest lead of the season, and confident this is their year again.

Tomorrow they meet the Dodgers, supposedly the threat of the senior circuit, in a doubleheader which may have great bearing on the outcome of the second half of baseball's statistical year. The Reds' current margin over the runner up is five games.

Win, lose, or draw, the figures add up this way:—

Were it Manager Bill McKechnie's way, the champions could coast the rest of the way on 500 ball. Winning 37 of the remaining 74 games would give 92 won, 62 lost, average .597, and many a pennant has been won on less. However, such a program would require cooperation from Brooklyn and probably New York Giants—both notably cantankerous at times.

Reds Start 16-game Tour In Fine Shape

PAWTUCKET, R. I., July 22.—(AP)—A straight-heat victory for the illustrious Greyhound in the Trotting Club Stake and the brilliant triumph of the Alken Stable's Kuno in the American Stake featured the belated opening of the Grand Circuit meeting here this afternoon, under the auspices of the Rhode Island and Trotting Club Inc.

A crowd of 8,000 voiced enthusiastic approval of the return of the harness horse sport to Rhode Island for the first time in 33 years at this track, far more famed for its place in the thoroughbred race sport.

Scarcely pressed for the heat, Greyhound went his first mile in 2:05 1/2 and the second in 2:05, winning easily from the Arden Homestead Stable's Bagpiper, the first heat and from his stablemate, Sister Mary, in the second.

Kuno, two-year-old champion of 1939, and Winter Book, favorite of the Hambletonian, showed his best form of this season in winning the American Stake. He was third in the first heat run in the first time of 2:00 3/4 by Harry Short's Remus with C. W. Phellis's Spencer Scott second. But Kuno took the next two in succession, each in 2:05, with Remus closest to him in the second and Spencer Scott pressing him in the third. All three heats were close, the judges calling for the of-ficial picture to decide the winner of the first heat.

Spencer Scott got away far back of the rest of the field in the second heat and finished eighth.

Owned and driven by M. M. Parshall, the colt whipped his field in straight heats without trouble.

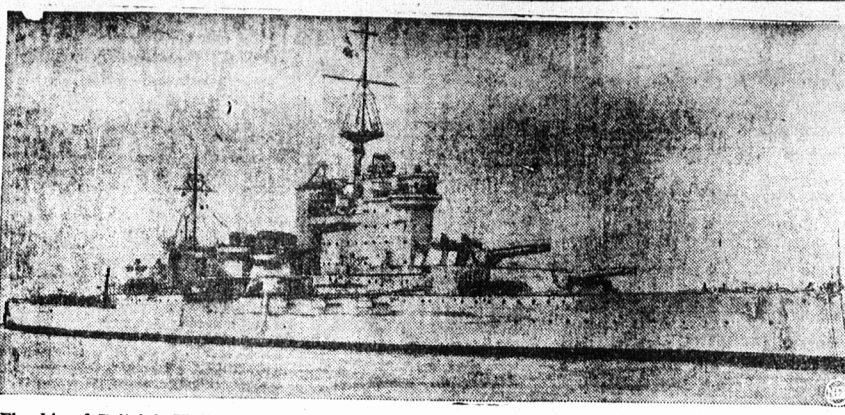
