KENNETH BUCK SENTENCED TO 24 YEAR TERM

Kidnapper of Peggy MacMath Convicted And Sentenced—Brother is Freed.

BARNSTABLE, Mass., June 25.—Kenneth Buck stood convicted tonight by a Cape Cod jury of kidnapping 10-year-old Peggy MacMath and he was under sentence to not less than 24 and not more than 25 years in state prison.

The verdict was brought in by a jury of Cape Cod landmen in Barnstable superior court Saturday night after seven hours of deliberation during which time the jury returned to the courtroom twice to receive additional instructions from Judge Edward F. Hanly.

FOUR MAJOR PROBLEMS EMPHASIZED

CROWN RESTS CASE IN HENWOOD TRIAL

C. Guy Black, Defence Counsel, Will Open Case For Accused Today.

AMHERST, N. S., June 25.—Crown evidence completed, the defence prepared tonight to open its case for Alvah Henwood, on trial in Supreme Court for the murder of Mrs. Mabel Smith in February.

While Mr. Black did not announce his line of action, it was understood several of the 10 witnesses he has subpoenaed would be called upon to give evidence as to Henwood's character.

The defence counsel lost his first important legal brush at Saturday's session when Mr. Justice Hugh Ross admitted a statement in which Henwood "confessed" to killing the aged invalid.

His signed admission implicated Trueman Smith, a companion of the same age who is held in connection with the murder and will go on trial at the conclusion of Henwood's case.

Both boys were arrested two weeks after Mrs. Smith was killed and her home robbed of about \$130.

Trinidad Bank Reduces Interest On Mortgages

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 25.—The Agricultural Bank of Trinidad and Tobago has reduced interest on mortgages held from 7 to 6 percent and interest on temporary advances from 8 to 6, retroactive to January, 1933.

BISHOP OF REICH OFFERS RESIGNATION

German Church Leader Claims Work Is Hampered By Nazi Appointment.

BERLIN, June 25.—(A.P.)—The closest advisers of Dr. Friedrich Von Bodelschwingh, who yesterday returned his commission as Evangelical Bishop of the Reich in answer to the appointment by the Nazi Government of a church commissioner, said today that the popular pastor still considers himself holder of the high office.

Dr. Bodelschwingh, they said, is hindered in execution of his duties as a result of the latest Nazi move in the church controversy but a careful reading of his "resignation" indicates that he has not yet renounced title to the post.

"Through the appointment of a state commissioner for all the Protestant churches of Prussia," Dr. Bodelschwingh's statement said yesterday, "I no longer have any possibility of executing the office conferred upon me. This necessitates my returning the commission entrusted me by the evangelical church union."
