THE FIRST DEATH IN THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—The first death among the Canadian expeditionary force occurred late Saturday night under mysterious circumstances. The body of a soldier in khaki from the West Down South camp was found on the road early Sunday morning, and inquiry so far has failed to identify him.

STRONG REASON FOR UNION WITH CANADA

Newfoundland's Position Would be Dangerous in Case of Allies' Misfortune.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The Herald prints the following from St. John's, Newfoundland:—

The possibility of a union of Newfoundland with Canada is receiving renewed attention from political leaders here as a result of the European war.

Advances of the idea show the danger of this colony of a separate existence if misfortune should come to the Allies in the present struggle, and they emphasize also the strategic advantage to Canada of the possession of Newfoundland at the mouth of the St. Lawrence River.

In this connection the possible fate of the French island of Miquelon in the event of a German victory is being considered on account of its suitability as a naval coaling station.

TWO LIVES LOST IN MAINE FIRE.

CALAIS, Oct. 19.—News of the saddest happening of the year hereabouts comes in the report of a tragedy which occurred at North Perry on Thursday, in which two young children of Mr and Mrs Fred Eaton lost their lives in a fire which consumed their home, a fair-sized frame dwelling situated a short distance from the Murchie mill.

According to William Flagg, who was boarding at the Eaton place, the fire was caused by the bursting of the chimney, which was located in the centre of the building while the accumulated soot in the chimney was burning. So rapid was the spread of the flames in the upper storey of the dwelling, which was partitioned off and covered only with sheathing paper, that the six occupants of the sleeping rooms were caught in a trap, from which only four of the six escaped.
