REV. ALEXANDER LAIRD, Professor of Literature, in the Military College, Kingston, Ont., with his brother David, a Winnipeg lawyer, sons of Rev. Robt. Laird, are spending their vacation in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. They are natives of Malpeque, where their father ministered many years.

The government steamer Minto has arrived at Quebec and is under instruction to remain in readiness to take Earl and Countess Grey, and the house sold for a trip to the Island of Anticosti and the maritime provinces. The date of their departure will be fixed as soon as the governor general returns from Ottawa.

In connection with the new I. C. R. station at Picton, a wharf is to be built running parallel with the freight shed. It will be 725 feet long and 80 feet wide, and will be built of crossotiled piles. There will be four tracks on the wharf, and about 10,000 cubic yards of dredging must be done before the water alongside will be deep enough to accommodate vessels berthing at the port.

A COMMERCIAL man who has just returned from Cape Breton, says he was much surprised to meet so many old men and women and all of them enjoying excellent health and able to work. "But," he said, "a gentleman in North Sydney drove me out of town a few miles and I was introduced to the pioneer couple of that section. The old gentleman is 97 years of age, and his wife is 89 years of age if she lives till July 17th, of this year. The old man was hoeing potatoes in the field, and the old lady was knitting and humming a Gaelic song. They are Presbyterians in their religious faith and walk to church over a mile.

WILLARD KITCHEN, of Fredericton, was in the city on Wednesday on his way to Moncton, whence he goes to Quebec. Mr. Kitchen has the contract for some work on the I. C. R. near St. Leonard's Junction and Mitchell's station, in Quebec. This work consists of the building of two bridges, both of some length, and the construction of a piece of road. This bit of road is built with a view to making unnecessary several curves which are in the line as it now is. All this work, Mr. Kitchen said, will, if things go well, be completed this fall. Mr. Kitchen also has the job of building the line of railway between Montague and Cardigan, in Prince Edward Island. This line, he said, will probably be ready for opening early in October.—St. John Globe.

OTTAWA city and the Consumers' Gas Company have reached an agreement by which the city pays the latter the sum of \$300,000 for its plant, etc., the company, however, to hand over to the city only \$30,000 worth of the \$10,000 stock on hand, thus making the price equivalent to \$270,000. The company originally asked \$225,000 and the city offered \$230,000, but to avoid delay and expense incidental to arbitration the parties compromised at \$207,000. The by-law giving effect to the negotiation has passed its third reading and was not delayed by any notice of reconsideration.
