The building has passed the Insurance Inspections most rigid ex-amination, and for the purpose it is now used, it is safe in every sen-
The two exits can empty the hall in five minutes and with the audiences coming and going all the time, as in any picture house, the over-filling of the hall is prevented and safety assured.
