LIQUOR CLEARANCE BILL DEFEATED

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Prior to 1930 there was no law to prevent the clearance of liquor from Canada to the United States, in spite of the fact that the laws of that country forbade the importation of liquor. Exporters could clear liquor in the usual way just as in the case of exports to other countries, the customs authorities not concerning themselves with the fact that the cargo could not be legitimately landed in the country for which it was destined.

The last session of Parliament under Liberal regime, in 1930, saw the enactment of a measure which forbade the clearance of liquor from Canadian bonded warehouses, destined for any country into which the importation of liquor was illegal.

The bill debated and defeated in the House of Commons today would have repealed the act of 1930 and restored to Canada the right to issue clearances for liquor destined to such countries and to collect the excise revenue thereon.

The President-elect from his special train today wired Mr. Hoover as follows:
