*SPECIAL SERVICE — A special service commemorating Good Friday was held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, conducted by the pastor, Reverend F. N. *RIVER OPEN — The Montague River is now completely open for traffic, and Saturday saw the first boats arriving in port. It is understood that the Georgetown ferry is ready to begin its duties, if it has not already begun, so that once the roads are in a good travelling condition, there will be plenty of work for the ferry. It is seen that the fishing boats at the Montague wharves are getting ready for the fishing season, and will soon be leaving here for another berth. It is expected that vessels will soon be arriving in port to load produce for transportation to other ports. It is unfortunate that the river has become considerably silted, since larger ships would be able to make this port. Normal draught ships, however, have no difficulty to arrive at the wharves. Nevertheless, it is hoped that the river will be dredged before too long, so that these larger ships, may come to Montague. Economically it would be of great advantage since the normal flow of exports and imports to this locality would be greatly increased, and would aid immensely in the development of the town.

Former Islander Wins Scholarship

University of Alberta officials Wednesday announced the award of the John Dolson Oliver Mother-sill Memorial Scholarship to Bernard Joseph Bowen of Carstairs, president of the Students' Union for the past year. Mr. Bowen, member of this year's graduating class in agriculture, was awarded the scholarship in recognition of distinguished service to his fellow students during the past year. The award is valued at \$150. The scholarship, awarded for the first time this year, was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Chard of Victoria in memory of the late J. D. O. Motherill, an arts graduate who was a prominent student during the years 1912-16. The terms of the award stipulate that it shall be made to a student selected for outstanding contribution to student life in the university especially through good citizenship and active support of student government. Mr. Bowen was recommended by a committee composed of Dr. H. T. Sparby, university provost, as chairman; Miss Maimie Simpson, adviser to women students; Prof. J. W. Porteous, representing the university committee on awards, and W. A. Dinwoodie, secretary-manager of the Students' Union. This committee was guided by the results of an all-student vote which took place at the time of the students' union elections in March. Mr. Bowen, who was born at Carstairs, P. E. I., is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. B. Bowen of Carstairs. He is a graduate of the Olds School of Agriculture and served during the war in the R.C.N.V.R. aboard H.M.C.S. Haida. He entered the faculty of agriculture in 1945. — Edmonton Journal.
