GALE CAUSES DAMAGE—A strong northeast gale caused considerable damage along the eastern coast recently. It was learned last night a boat belonging to John Stock, fisherman, was driven ashore at Macdonald Brothers' factory, Northampton Island, and badly damaged. Another boat nearby was sunk and her moorings. A number of craft at Graham's factory, Georgetown, were also driven ashore and damaged.

FIRE AT LAUNCHING—A barn and two outbuildings owned by Mrs. Dan G. MacCormack, Lamiching, P. E. I., were burned to the ground Wednesday. It was learned last night. Cause of the fire was not known. The flames were first noticed in the barn of Mrs. MacCormack. The blaze spread rapidly and a large quantity of seed oats and a valuable wagon was lost. Neighbors who quickly gathered managed to save the house but not before the fire had ignited two other buildings. For some time the home of Mrs. Charles E. Yorkston, postmaster, was threatened but efforts of the fire fighters were successful.

FINED FOR NOT HAVING LEMON EXTRACT RECORDS—A local merchant appeared before Magistrate George J. Tweedy yesterday charged under the Prohibition Act with not keeping the required record of his sales of lemon extract. He was sentenced to pay a twenty dollar fine and costs or in lieu of payment spend 30 days in jail. He paid up an amount of money charged with having merchandise in his possession was fined \$100 and costs or three months in jail. THE CHURCH PARADE

On Sunday, May 9th the annual Church parade took place to Trinity United Church and the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer. Owing to the inclemency of the weather the parades did not march from Queen Square as previously planned, but met at the church halls. At Trinity United Church the Guides and Brownies of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 6th and 7th units, the Charlottetown Rangers and representatives of the Marshfield-Dunstaffnage Rangers, numbering over 250 were present and were welcomed by the Rev. Mr. MacKenzie. An able address was given by the Rev. Dr. Bruce on the work of the Y.M.C.A. in China. At the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer the Guides and Brownies of St. Dunstan's Basilica (4th) and the Guides of the Holy Redeemer Church (6th) together with the Boy Scouts of both parishes attended in a body and took part in the May Procession. At 8 a.m. of the same day the 1st Charlottetown Company attended St. Peter's Cathedral and received Holy Communion in a body.

Concert by 5th Company

A splendid concert of high order was put on by the 5th Company on Monday, May 10th in the Holy Redeemer Hall, the feature being "The Mary Queen", a cantata in two scenes. Other pleasing numbers included vocal and violin solos, dances, dramatization of the legend of St. George and the Dragon and a Camp-fire Sing-song. Special mention should be made of the trio—two violins and piano under the direction of Miss K. Hornby.

The 5th Company is a new Company, having been formed last autumn, and its Guides Miss Dorothy McAleer and Miss Aileen Hughes are to be heartily congratulated on the rapid progress made. Coronation Parade

All Charlottetown Guides and Rangers took part in the Coronation Parade to the Forum. The Companies lined up and marched in the following order under the direction of Miss Fullerton, District Captain: St. James Church, St. Peter's Cathedral, St. Paul's Church, St. Dunstan's Basilica, Holy Redeemer Church, Trinity United Church No. 1, Trinity United Church No. 2, Charlottetown Rangers and Marshfield-Dunstaffnage Rangers. The Brownies did not take part in the parade but were present at the Forum with their Guides. The total turnout was about 375. Community Good Turn.

In commemoration of the coronation of Their Gracious Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, a Royal Oak seedling was planted on the grounds of the Provincial Sanatorium on Coronation Day. This baby oak tree was sent to this province with the best wishes of Mrs. H. D. Warren of Toronto, Dominion Commissioner, and was planted on behalf of the Girl Guides of P. E. I. by Mrs. John Reay, Provincial Commissioner. Each of the other provinces received the same gift from the Chief Commissioner of Canada. A large number of Charlottetown Guides were present at the ceremony. Miss Gillan, Division Commissioner, in a few words of explanation told the Guides that the seedling came from the royal forest at Windsor and was to be a living memorial of the coronation of the King and Queen. During the planting of the tree by Mrs. Reay, the Guides sang O Canada. The brief ceremony closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Convocation Exercises At Mount Allison

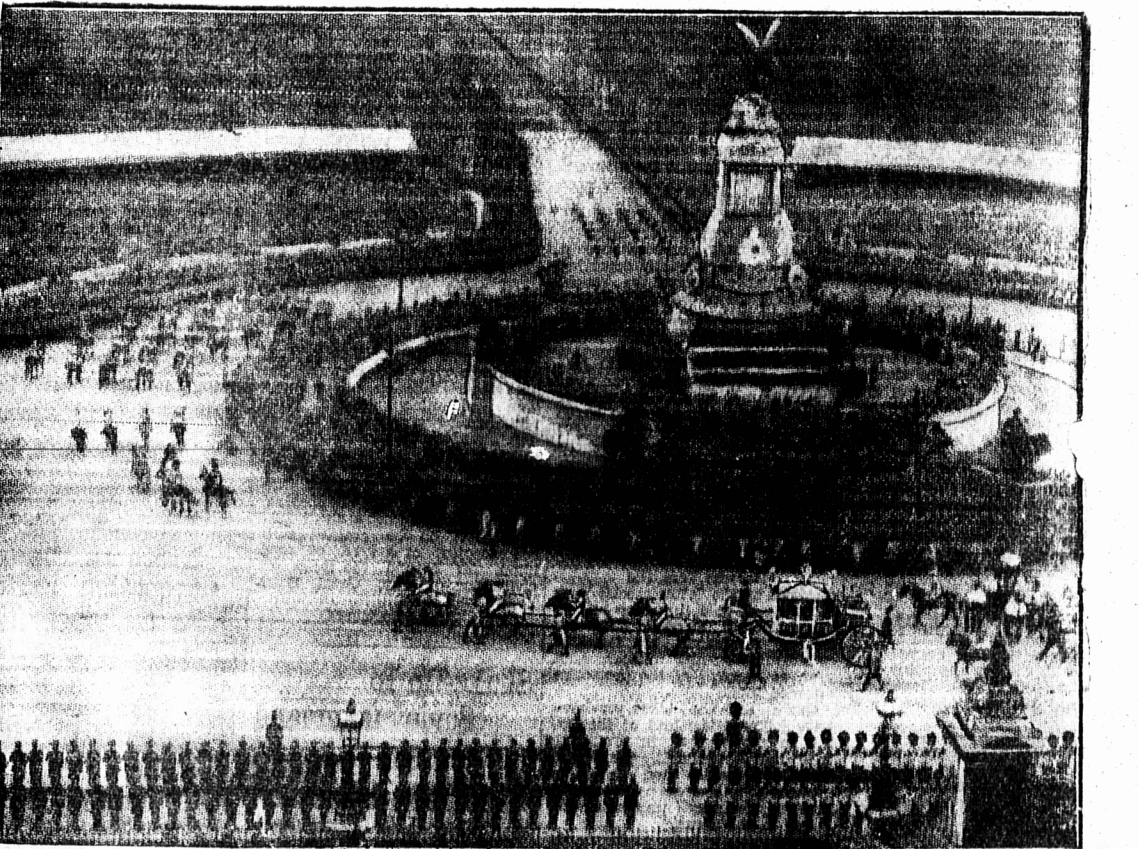

Selects Delegates To Service League

(C.P. Cable, By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, May 14—General Alex Ross, President of the Canadian Legion, today selected Colonel G. E. Reid, London, Ont., and Colonel E. A. Oliver of Toronto to be co-delegates with him to the British Empire Service League Conference. Alternates chosen were Major W. S. McInnis, Regina; Captain Thomas Wrayling, Ottawa; Dr. T. E. Robbins, Charlottetown; and R. Tompkinson, New Westminster, B. C., with Richard and MacKenzie Waters, both of Toronto attached. The Canadian delegation has a substantial list of resolutions to submit to the conference, the most important of which relate to Empire defence and armaments and Empire settlement. Following the conference General Ross will lead a Canadian delegation of 35 veterans on a good will mission to Germany.

W. F. Higgs Is Elected In Birmingham

Mr. Walter Frank Higgs, cousin of Mr. E. T. Higgs of Charlottetown, was elected recently to the British House of Commons to represent the constituency of Birmingham, made vacant by the recent death of Sir Austen Chamberlain. A national Unionist candidate he was elected by a majority of 2000.
