Martial Law Effective in Rumania

CLOTHING WORKERS OF MONTREAL GIVEN SATISFACTORY AGREEMENTS—ARE BACK ON JOB

MONTREAL, Aug. 3.—Two thousand men who quit work here last week when the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America called out on strike some six thousand of its members, returned to work here today. Five companies employing these men signed agreements satisfactory to the workers. Negotiations between other manufacturers affected by the strike and union officials, are in progress.

Russian System of Government Is Condemned

MOSCOW, August 3.—In what proved to be his dying speech Felix Dzerzhinsky, chairman of the Supreme Economic Council, shook the Communist Party to its depths. In terms of remarkable candor and scorn he condemned the present bureaucracy, red tape, duplication of effort and complicated government.

Conservative Party Not to Revive Titles

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 3.—The Montreal rumor that the Conservative party may seek to revive "titles" and that R. S. White, former M. P. for Montreal, may be knighted in return for the capital has entirely ridiculous. It may be recalled that titles were abolished during the session of 1917-18, and that the chief instigator of the abolition was Hon. W. F. Nickle, Conservative member for Kingston, and present time attorney general in Ontario.

Canada's Export Trade Increases

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Aug. 3.—Canada's export trade during the year ending June 30, reached the record breaking total of \$1,445,421,956 at Charlottetown, rain. The following table shows the period when prices were inflated and when Canada was exporting large quantities of munitions. The dominion total imports during the year were not far from the billion mark standing at \$962,178,725. The exports showed an increase over the preceding twelve months of \$256,775,861, and the imports a gain of \$153,456,719.

Abandons Swim

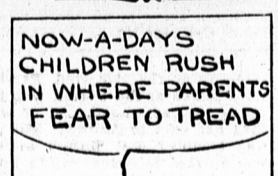
