Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. FOOD BOARD FLASHES FOR FEMINE FOLK

We haven't been saying too much about them all summer but now that this year's crop is a reality, it is high time to begin talking potatoes again. The crop is a fair one. The war gardens have helped considerably and few homes this year will be without some potatoes of their own growing. The farm houses will have the usual large quantity to put down in the cellar for winter use.

The farmer's wives do not have far to look for substitutes for wheat flour for use in bread-making while they have plenty of potatoes in the cellar. It would be hard to find a better substitute than the mashed potatoes left over from dinner. They can be used with flour up to a 50 per cent proportion. The oven should not be too hot when baking bread with potatoes, and the large natural moisture content of the tuber should be taken into account in preparing the sponge.

At a time when there is a greater demand on the world's food resources than ever before, it is interesting to note that with all of her teeming millions, only 18 per cent of Asia's land, 12 per cent of that of North and South America, 27 per cent of that of Europe and 5 per cent of that of Australia have ever felt the touch of the plow. Without encroaching at all upon the world's forests, but taking into account only the steppes, pampas, savannas and prairie lands, there might be added to the earth's farming lands an area twice as great as that now under active agricultural operations.
