The Electra arrived at 6.30 last night with a large cargo and seven passengers. The cargo included 102 cases eggs, 20 bags potatoes, 9 bbls codfish, 30 pkgs sundries and 333 lobsters eggs shipped by E. M. Jordan, Wm. Lamont, Miller and McHeron, Norman McLeod and Prowse & Sons. The passengers included Mr. Kennedy, M. H. North, Miss Hyde, M. H. Suu h, Professor Jordan, Norman McLeod and Mr. King.

The City of London brought 50 passengers from Orwell yesterday. Her cargo comprised 50 cases eggs, 50 bags oats, 35 cases lobsters, and other small sundries. The S. S. City of London came in last evening at 8.30 with over one dozen excursionists who took advantage of the afternoon sail to Orwell and return. The cargo consisted of 75 tobacco boxes, 85 cases eggs, 10 cases lobsters, 5 boxes butter, 6 lambs, 18 bags potatoes, 4 bales wool and 2 bundles hides.

The death of Rufus C. Leard, aged 44 years son of John N. Leard, Tryon which took place at the home of his father on Tuesday will be longed with great regret by many friends. The deceased was quiet and unostentatious led a good life and was much beloved by all his acquaintances. Dr. C. F. Fraser, Principal of the Halifax School for the Blind has arranged to visit the Island with a party of twelve teachers and pupils from that very excellent institution, giving free exhibitions of the work done in the School, in Charlottetown, Alberton, Summerside, George town, Mount Stewart and Souris. The party will arrive from Picton tonight. In the morning they will go Alberton, returning to Charlottetown next Thursday and leaving the Island on the following Saturday morning. On Thursday and Friday evenings of next week they will give exhibitions in the Opera House, consisting of music and literary entertainment, scholastic exercises, display of articles manufactured by the pupils and an address by Dr. Fraser descriptive of the school, its methods of instruction, its finances and other matters relating to the education of the blind. Admission will be free, but to prevent undesirable persons being present, admission will be by tickets obtainable from the various clergymen of the city, at the drug stores of J. G. Jamieson and C. D. Rankin, or from L. W. Watson, who has kindly consented to make all arrangements for Dr. Fraser. It is customary for hospitable people in each town visited to entertain the members of the party at their homes. Any persons desiring to provide accommodation for any of the visitors will please communicate with Mr. Watson or notify their clergyman, who will give their names to him. Tonight the party will stay at the Queen Hotel. Hospitality will be gladly accepted for next Thursday and Friday. Two pupils usually go together.



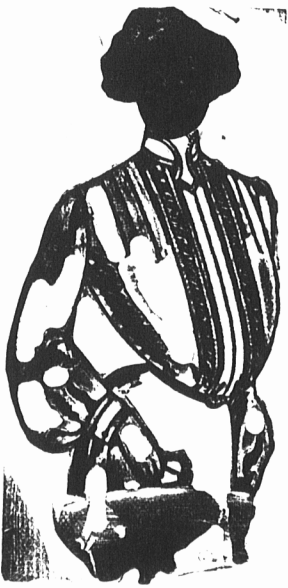
