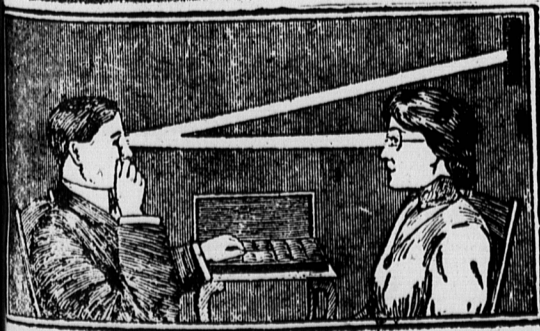
RACES ARE STAKES AND ENTRIES CLOSED IN SAME ON SATURDAY, JUNE 5th.

The following are the classes and conditions governing same: For All Trot and Pace, Purse, \$400.00; Straight Trot, Purse, 300.00; Straight Pace, Purse, 300.00; Entry Free of Five Percent payable as follows: one percent on the 5th, Two Percent on Saturday July 3rd, Two percent on Sunday July 31st, when horses must be named. Five percent additional from all money winners. All races mile heats, best three in five in harness, and to finish at the end of the fifth heat when money will be awarded according to standing in summary.

Any horse distancing the field, or any part thereof, entitled to one mile only. Two or more horses may be nominated by the same stable, in one race, and each entry will be eligible to start when full entrance fee has been paid on each. This track is a member of the National Trotting Association, and will be governed by its rules except where they conflict with the above.
