Assault Charge At Summerside Now Being Tried

(Special to the Guardian) SUMMERSIDE, July 31.—The preliminary hearing of the charge of aggravated assault occasioning actual bodily harm against five men by the name of Yeo, from Port Hill, began before Magistrates John E. Campbell and F. W. Cannon at the Court House, Summerside on Thursday. The Attorney General appeared for the prosecution and Calvin D. McCallum for the defense. The case caused a good deal of interest, the Court being crowded all day. At the outset the case against one of the accused, namely Gerald Yeo, was withdrawn as evidence of witnesses proved that he had taken no part in the assault. Evidence was taken from six witnesses regarding the nature of the alleged assault, which took place at the store of John W. Ellis at Springhill last Saturday night. The evidence was to the effect that one of the prisoners appeared to be lying in a drunken condition in the above mentioned store. Some remark was made and the prisoner jumped up and struck the counter scales, knocking them down and damaging them. He then struck the lamp which fell to the floor. Charles Emman came into the store and told the Yeo brothers not to think that they were running the place. He grappled with Kenneth Yeo and tried to push him out of the store. Witness testified that one of the others caught him and pulled him out of the door, knocking him down. One of them said not to touch him while he was down, but another dealt him a severe blow with his fist. Emman was rendered unconscious and his assailants stood around him and once or twice they lifted him up and let him fall again face down. An hour later a brother of the injured man arrived at his home and a young man followed to tell him of the trouble. They went over and found the Yeo boys and their father still on the road and their victim lying unconscious near the store. He was taken home and medical aid summoned. At 3 a. m. on Sunday he was taken to Summerside to the Prince County Hospital and remained in an unconscious state until late Sunday afternoon. His condition is still regarded as serious. As the injured man is still unable to leave the hospital, the case was adjourned until next Wednesday, with a view to getting his evidence and that of the doctors who attended him. The accused are still out on bail.

The report of Mr. Hamilton's death, which appeared in several Canadian exchanges, read as follows: "The death is reported from Kalamazoo, Mich., of Ross Hamilton, well known as a female impersonator with the "Dumbbells" Theatrical company. No details of his death are available. Mr. Hamilton, who was born in Amherst, N. S., served as a stretcher bearer during the war. Previous to this, he had no stage experience but when concert parties were organized among the Canadian troops in France, he created his famous role of "Marjorie." After the war the troupe of soldier actors with whom he had played at concerts in France were organized as the "Dumbbells." They enjoyed a successful season in London and then toured Canada, including Prince Edward Island. Ross Hamilton was one of the stars of the company then and a few years later when they invaded New York City for a successful three months stand at the Ambassador Theatre and in the annual Canadian tours. Dr. H. V. Hamilton, of Sackville, N. B., is a brother."

Resignations Likely To Come

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., July 31.—Though official confirmation could not be obtained early today, full credence is given here to the report that Hon. Vincent Massey has tendered his resignation and that Hon. W. H. Marien, Minister to Japan, has either done so or will do so immediately. In diplomatic circles at the Capital it is pointed out that this would be done as a matter of course by any Minister appointed by a Canadian Government. Thus Sir George Perley, who was High Commissioner at London in 1921, promptly sent his resignation to the MacKenzie King Government after its election in December of that year. Charles A. Magrath, at present chairman of the International Joint Commission, has been suggested as Canada's representative at Washington. It is pointed

ST. JOHN'S, N.B., July 30.—The blood and flesh of raw codfish was the drink and food that sustained two young Newfoundlanders during the forty-eight hours they were astray from the Lunenburg fishing schooner Alsatian, recently. Low fog beneath brilliant sun and a water surface like glass were the conditions under which Alfred Hardy, 19, and James Baker, 29, both of Rancourt East, finally reached land by bar and sail after leaving the vessel later owing to the schooner in a dory and falling to low-lying fog.

The Alsatian, commanded by Captain Harold Corkum, took on baiting at Caplin Bay and sailed for the Grand Banks, where it engaged in fishing for four days. On the morning of the last day, Monday, Hardy and Baker left the schooner as dory mates their duty was to shift the 24 lines, each being 50 fathoms in length. They then started a course in the apparent direction of the schooner No bell or horn was heard, however, and no sign of the vessel could be detected in the dense fog. The fishermen roved until night approached, when they set a northwest course by their compass and put up sail in hope of striking land or being sighted by some craft.

On Tuesday morning the weather was very warm. Their thirst became almost unbearable, the men split some of the fish in the dory, drinking the blood and eating some of the flesh. Little was said of how the men spent the rest of that day and night, but the continued, warm weather and lack of supplies indicates to some extent the ordeal suffered. At daybreak Wednesday morning a reflected light in the sky led Baker to believe St. John's was within reach. An hour later they thought they were off Cape St. Francis. Taking down sail, they rowed to a fishing stage near a house and found they were at Flat Rock, St. John's East, where neither had ever been before. They were given food, tobacco and shelter, and left later in the day for St. John's.

Shaken by their experience, Hardy and Baker decided to give up the fishing voyage for this year.

New Cabinet Names For Ontario Mentioned Hon. Hugh Guthrie (South Wellington), Hon. R. J. Manion (Fort William), Hon. J. D. Chaplin (Lincoln) and Hon. E. B. Ryckman (Toronto East) are all likely appointees. Premier G. Howard Ferguson, who was very active in the general election, has been frequently mentioned; but there is some doubt. Mr. Guthrie and Dr. Manion served in the Conservative administration prior to the 1921 election and again in 1926. Mr. Chaplin and Mr. Ryckman were members of the Conservative cabinet in the Dominion election four years ago.

Manitoba Possibilities The name of Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of Public Works in the Government of Sir Robert Borden, is mentioned for Manitoba. For Saskatchewan, it would not be surprising if J. H. Turnbull, who defeated Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance, in Regina were chosen. The Premier-elect himself will give representation to Alberta. For the Pacific coast province, General A. D. McRae, chief Conservative whip, and Hon. H. H. Stevens are mentioned. Both met defeat with the turning over of the Vancouver seats into the Liberal column; but a constituency could easily be opened.

Regarding the forthcoming Imperial Conference the paper says: "The day of reality is at hand. Canada wants to sell us her wheat. If we buy it she will make equivalent concessions to British manufacturers. Our only method is to tax foreign wheat entering Britain. "A realist Canadian Government stands ready to do business with us. Have we no one to send into the conferences with them but fanatics or faint hearts?" the Daily Express asks.
