ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

George W. Simpson, M. L. A., was sworn in a member of the Executive Council yesterday forenoon in place of the late Captain Malcolm McDonald.

A TELEGRAM to Hon. Mr. Cumiskey received from Quebec last evening states that the City of London will sail from that port on the 18th for Charlottetown.

The annual meeting of the C. A. A. held last night in the Police Court room was adjourned until Saturday morning. The adjourned meeting will be held in the Y.M.C.A. building. All shareholders are requested to attend punctually.

It is supposed that Driver Wall of Truro who was killed in the accident on the I. C. R. near Windsor Junction on Saturday night last, was a brother of Mrs. Whiston, wife of Rev. Robert F. Whiston, formerly pastor of the Central Christian Church in this city.

LOWE Bros. have placed in position the handsome new plate glass door at the Apothecaries Hall, which was referred to at length in The Guardian some time ago. The door has ball bearing hinges and a special patent arrangement to prevent the door slamming, which Mr. Hughes procured when in Toronto some time ago.

THE death took place yesterday afternoon about one o'clock of one of the oldest colored residents and one of the best known in the person of Nathaniel DeCoursey. The deceased had been in ill health for some time and was confined in the P. E. I. Hospital for some weeks last winter. He had never fully recovered from this illness at that time.

THE death took place at Chenery, St. Francis, Cal., March 23, 1903, of Duncan Macdonald, aged 63 years. The deceased left Valleyfield, P. E. I., in 1858. He was a son of the late Donald Macdonald, Sr., and brother of Angus and Allan Macdonald, of Valleyfield East, also John S. Macdonald and Mrs. Angus Finlayson, of Whim Road Cross. A sorrowing widow and nine children are left to mourn.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. THURSDAY, April 16th.

House met at 11.

Hon. Mr. WHELAN presented a petition from Benjamin C. Prowse, Annie McArthur, Jesse J. Lane, Benjamin Bremner and others, praying that a bill may be passed at the present session incorporating them under the name of "Carter and Company Limited", granting to the said Company the usual corporation powers.

Hon. Mr. WHELAN introduced a Bill to incorporate "Carter Company Limited."

Hon. R. C. McLEOD moved the House into committee to consider a bill to incorporate the town of Summerside.

The consideration of the Summerside Incorporation Act was resumed in committee and progress was reported.
