WORK AT CAR FERRY TERMINAL.—Mr. T. H. Barrett, Superintendent for the Roger Miller Co., has started work on the Car Ferry terminal at Carleton Point. The tea tables of course were the centres of attraction and were laden with an abundance of salads, creams, cakes, pastry, etc. The ladies of St. James are noted for their cooking, but last evening's tea was voted by those present as the best ever given by them. There was a large number of visitors, present including several of the members of Parliament, visiting clergymen and visitors from Summerside who came in by special train. Over \$300 was realized.

A special meeting of the Executive committee of the Central Farmers Institute was held in Prince of Wales College on Thursday, April 27th, 1916. The following members were present: President, D. N. McKay, Dr. P. C. Gauthier, Robert Agnew, Peter Brodie, J. A. Clark and W. H. McGregor, Lot 16. The minutes of the Annual meeting were read and approved to include the names of the officers of the Association for the present year. The minutes were then approved. On motion the Executive reassert their commendation made at the Annual meeting of the work in Rural Science inaugurated and so successfully pursued in Prince of Wales College and now being started in the country by Prof. S. B. McCready. The question regarding transportation of exhibits to the Amherst Fair was reported settled satisfactorily by the Railway. The question of Potato Culture and improved methods for the thorough spraying of this crop against blight and other diseases was fully discussed by all present. It was unanimously agreed that the Executive recommend the Farmers Institutes to co-operate in securing better machinery for spraying and that they get in touch with Mr. Paul A. Murphy, Plant Pathologist at the Experimental Station, who is ready to do all in his power to assist the important industry of potato growing. It was moved by Mr. Robert Agnew and seconded by Peter Brodie that J. A. Clark, Dr. Gauthier and D. N. McKay be a committee to wait on the proper authorities in an endeavor to secure the same freight rate per mile on fertilizers coming to Prince Edward Island as now being charged in the other Provinces.

The message is as follows: I cannot allow the anniversary of the second battle of Ypres to pass without once again expressing my profound admiration of the gallantry of the Canadian troops and my high appreciation of the invaluable assistance they rendered. Field Marshal Viscount French. To this Sir Robert Borden sent the following: The people of Canada appreciate most deeply your message of yesterday. On their behalf I send warmest thanks. We are assured that the Canadian Expeditionary forces will always maintain the splendid traditions so firmly established a year ago. Signed (Borden).
