

# Orioles Hand Royals Defeat In Twin Bill

MONTREAL, May 12—(CP)—Baltimore Orioles handed Montreal's faltering Royals a double setback today taking the opening game of an International League doubleheader 7-6 in 11 innings and launching forth with a 12-hit assault in the seven-inning nightcap for a 12-4 triumph.

Kemp Wicker, Montreal left-hander, suffered his first loss of the season after four straight victories in the opener. Gene Hassen's home run with the bases loaded in the sixth inning was Montreal's most effective blow of the game.

The Orioles got 10 runs in the first four innings of the second game, routing Bob Porter and continuing their attack on three other hurlers. Halo Chasing hurtled eight hit ball for the Orioles.

The Bisons won a doubleheader from Toronto Maple Leafs 4-3 and 5-3 at Buffalo. The double victory boosted Buffalo ahead of Montreal and Newark for fourth place.

Otto Camerle smashed a line drive with the bases loaded in the 10th inning to give the Bisons the opener. The Bisons walked away with the second game, hammering the Toronto pitchers for 13 hits.

At Syracuse, Rochester Red Wings won their winning streak to date by taking a doubleheader from the Cubs, capturing the opener in 11 innings 6-4 and the abbreviated nightcap 3-2 to remain in a tie for second place.

Home runs led the story as Jersey City Giants vanquished the Bears in both ends of a doubleheader 8-6 and 5-0 at Newark. The twin reverse ran the Bears' losing streak to five games and dropped them into the second division.

Round-trip blasts by Johnny Dickster and Jimmie Vernon in a 4-0 opening accounted for five of Jersey City's six runs in the first two frames. Ed Levy hit a homer for Newark.

In the nightcap, Dickster slugged another for the circuit, his sixth of the year, and Aubrey Epps also homered.

At St. Paul, Little Giants beat the four Buffalo pitchers Saturday, pounding out 22 hits in a 21-8 victory to keep their lead in the International League baseball race.

Three home runs, by Harry Davis, Estel Crabtree and George Kuroski, accounted for four runs in the seventh inning that gave Rochester Red Wings 9-7 victory over Newark Bears.

Syracuse Stars scored four runs in the last two innings to beat the Maple Leafs 5-3 in the first game of a doubleheader at Toronto and the teams played to a 6-6 tie in the second.

At Montreal, Bill Nagel's seventh inning 355-foot home run broke up a pitcher's battle between Ted Olson of Baltimore and Steve Radchuk of the Devils and gave the Orioles a 1-0 victory.

## Yankees Get First Win In 9 Games; Beat Red Sox 4-0

NEW YORK, May 12—(AP)—The world champion New York Yankees got back in the groove today, after dropping eight straight American League games, and hit out Boston Red Sox 4-0 on the sixth inning of Red Ruffing.

Ruffing easily earned his second victory against two defeats, striking out eight, walking only two and never letting a Boston runner get past second base. He even made two hits and a run himself.

It was the first loss in seven games for the league-leading Sox and their first shutout this season, but the shuffled Yankee lineup never gave them a chance.

Eddie Auker used his "submarine" ball to good effect against the Indians and gave St. Louis Browns a 5-2 victory at Cleveland and a tie for fifth place.

Auker went the route for the Browns, allowing nine hits and collecting three of St. Louis' 12 blows.

Johnny Babich baffled Washington Senators with two-hit pitching for seven innings and then was replaced for four more innings as the Athletics triumphed 4-2 at Philadelphia. The victory gave the

Mackinnon undisputed possession of fourth place.

It was Babe's fourth win of the season against one defeat. The veteran Ted Lyons had enough on the ball to grab his second victory of the season and lead Chicago White Sox to a 4-3 victory over the Tigers at Detroit.

He yielded eight hits, including homers by Pinky Higgins and Dick Barrett that accounted for all Detroit's runs, but kept them scattered.

Boston Red Sox sent the Yankees down to their eighth straight defeat Saturday as they scored a 9-8 victory over the world champions in an American League baseball game at New York. Lou Finney homered with the bases loaded for Boston.

## Bimelech Takes Revenge In Defeating Gallahadion

BALTIMORE, Md., May 12—(AP)—Bimelech "squared himself" Saturday.

Rebounding from his failure in the Kentucky Derby a week ago, Colonel E. R. Bradley's pride of the blue grass roared back in the Golden Jubilee running of the Preakness to gallop home two lengths in front before a crowd estimated at 55,000, the largest turnout in Maryland's racing history.

He drove down the stretch and nothing else was even close. Colonel Bradley, whose health forbade his appearance at Churchill Downs last Saturday, sat in a grandstand box and smiled his satisfaction at "this greatest horse I ever owned."

Bimmie was clocked in 1:58.3 for the 1 3/16 miles, nearly two seconds off the track record.

Freddy Fitzsimmons got credit for the triumph.

Chuck Klein hit his second home run in two days in the second inning, but Fitz knuckled stymied the Phils thereafter until the eighth when they pushed across an unearned run. Tot Pressnell came in and snuffed out the Philadelphia threat.

The Cardinals may have given Cincinnati Reds a close chase last year, but even the most ardent St. Louis fan had to admit today that 1940 seems to be another year.

The champion Reds swept a doubleheader at St. Louis today 7-1 and 13-4.

Ival Goodman smashed a home run in the first inning of the opening game, and three Cincinnati players—Frank McCormack, Lonnie Fry and Harry Craft—came through with circuit circuits in the nightcap.

The Cardinals made seven errors.

After Virgil Davis grounded out in the second, Frank Gustine singled and Pitcher Truett Sewell walked. At this point Dean went to the showers. Vern Olsen, Ken Raffenberg and Claude Passeau shared the mound duties the rest of the way.

Cincinnati's fast traveling Reds took over first place in the National Baseball League Saturday, beating St. Louis Cardinals 12-5 while the Dodgers were lost to Philadelphia at Brooklyn.

## Former Wrestling Champ Of America Is Dead At 83

WHYCOOMAGH, N. S., May 12—(CP)—MacDonald, once wrestling champion of America is dead at the age of 83 years.

He was known to Cape Bretoners as "Dr. Mac" during the 48 years he practiced medicine in the rural districts of Cape Breton Island.

During recent years he devoted himself to a study of the Celtic Macdonald and MacKinnon families from which he sprung.

It was while a student at Queen's University that he attained wrestling fame. In a match at the college he defeated Lynch, then the wrestling champion of America. The next day he won out on the track and won a gold medal for his general athletic proficiency.

Years later after he had returned to his native Cape Breton Highlands, Dr. Hud's fame spread throughout Nova Scotia. Once while he was conducting a debate operation of America, the doctor won a man with a reputation as a fighter came to the door and challenged him.

Dr. Hud left his patient for a moment to ask the challenger to keep quiet until he finished the operation. When the doctor returned, the patient just long enough to toss the bully over a nearby fence.

The Cape Breton doctor attributed his physical characteristics he inherited from his Scottish ancestors and the training he got in the highland games. He got in the highland training on a "clean, scientific" sport, with biting and gouging disallowed. Funeral services were held for him last week in the highland village of Lake Alnair.

## War Fails To Deter English Sport Lovers

LONDON, May 12—(CP CABLE)—Hiller's completed 25-kilometre in the low country failed to dampen the enthusiasm of the United Kingdom's sports fans at the week-end.
