EFFICIENT STEAM SERVICE.

The federal Government is solemnly and by every legal obligation bound to furnish the Island with efficient steam service to and from the Island and between the Island and the railway systems of Canada. From year to year, and every year, the Government has made default in this service. For almost two months—fifty-four days past, to be accurate—the service has utterly failed.

Now we are as much entitled to this efficient steam service as we are to the payment of the stipulated subsidy of eighty cents per head on our population, or the provision to give an annual grant for the cost of our Government and Legislature, or for the payment by the Dominion of the salaries of the Governor and Judges. Those payments the Dominion is bound to make to all the Provinces, and it has so far made them in good faith.

What would be said and thought if the Government failed from year to year partly or wholly to pay the stipulated subsidy to Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba or Nova Scotia? Would not any Province so treated go on strike? Would it not be justified in refusing to make further payments to the Dominion in taxes till the wrong was made right? Nay more, which one of the larger Provinces if so treated would not resort to summary measures to enforce its rights?

This then is our position. The Dominion Government has made default in a matter of solemn compact, the fulfilment of which is vital to our very existence. Of the two it would be better that the Dominion should hold back the cash subsidy of eighty cents per head than to default on the stipulated efficient steamer service. The time has come to speak plainly and act energetically. The federal Government must pay for its default, and must make good the service. The latter can only be done by supplying a real ice-navigating steamer and constructing the tunnel.

The default of the winter steamers is by no means the sum of our grievances, although it is just now the acute feature of it. "Efficient steam service summer and winter" is nominated in the cond. Surely this can only mean that such steam service shall carry freight to and from points on the Island to and from points on the mainland at such rates as prevail between points equal distances apart in two Provinces of the Mainland. Less than this is to "keep the word of promise to the ear and break it to the hope." And that is the way we have been treated.

We have never had "efficient steam communication" either summer or winter on equal terms with the transportation between the Provinces of the Mainland. In this matter the Government of the Dominion has made default against the spirit of the bond, justice and fairplay, year in and year out for thirty-two years since we entered the federation. And for this default we may fairly ask the Dominion to make good, and give us equal and equitable transportation rates in the future.

If now the Company has nothing further to offer and withdraws its witness from the court or refuses to permit him to be cross-examined, what conclusion would be drawn? We stated at the time of the publication of Mr. Hales' letter that we were glad to hear from the Navigation Company through its Secretary. We shall be glad to hear further from them now. The great court of public opinion is waiting to hear from them. Surely they will not permit judgment against them to go by default!
