Watson and Fenton read the lessons and Rev. Mr. Trivett of Milton, preached eloquently and at the offertory a solo was sung by Mr. Leard of Cascumpec.

FRUIT BLANC MANGE.

Cherries or raspberries are best for this dessert. Stew them gently and drain of the juice. Add sugar enough to suit the taste. Place in a double-boiler and heat steaming hot, then stir in cornstarch made into a paste with cold water. Allow two table-spoonfuls of cornstarch to a pint of juice. Stir and cook until thick enough to mold when cold. Pour into wet molds and set in a cold place. Turn from the molds and eat with sugar and cream.
