FRESH HERRING.—The first herring of the season were on sale in the Market yesterday. There were some taken from the nets at Stanhope early yesterday morning. They brought a ready sale at 3 cents each. Messrs. J. T. Crockett & Co. also had some on sale in the market which were caught at Canso.

MR. FLOOD'S ADVANCE.—The Montreal Star says: H. C. Flood, who has succeeded Major H. B. Stacey as manager of the Eastern Trust Company in this city, is a St. John, N.B., man, who has been associated with the company for the past four years. Previous to that he was connected with the Royal Securities Corporation representing it principally in the Maritime Provinces.

G. W. V. A.—The Ladies Auxiliary of the Great War Veterans' Association have received permission from Military Headquarters, Halifax, to hold an entertainment in the new Convalescent Home, in aid of their association. At a meeting of the Auxiliary held Saturday it was decided to hold this entertainment on the King's Birthday, June 2nd, particulars of which will be given later.

THE GAME LAWS.—The last issue to hand of the Canada Gazette contains the regulations of the Migratory Birds Convention Act. The following paragraphs affect this Province: No person shall kill, capture, injure, take, molest, sell or offer for sale any migratory game birds during the following periods: Ducks, Geese, Brant or Rails, in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Alberta, British Columbia, (northern district), Northwest Territories and Yukon Territory, December 15 to August 31, both days inclusive. Shorebirds or Waders, including only the following: Woodcock, Wilson or Jack snipe, blackbreasted and golden plover, and the greater and lesser yellow legs; in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and in the counties of Saguenay, Rimouski, Gaspé and Bonaventure in Quebec; December 1 to August 14, both days inclusive. Except that on woodcock and Wilson or Jack snipe the closed season in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick shall be from December 1 to September 14, and in Nova Scotia from December 15 to August 31, both inclusive.

CAPTAIN JOSEPH READ.—The Halifax Mail runs a "bureau of popular information" in which readers ask and receive replies to questions. In the issue of May 4th, appears the following question: "I see by the Mail that Capt. Read, in the Canadian Parliament, wants the duty taken off potatoes, so that Prince Edward Island can secure a market for their crop in the United States. What is the matter with the island? Potatoes retail in Halifax and Dartmouth at 40 cents a peck. Surely that should be a satisfactory price, considering that a few years ago island farmers were content to get 25 cents per bushel for their potatoes in this market. It is stated the island farmers have thousands of bushels of potatoes in the cellars going to rot, while the people are asked to go slow on food consumption. The Mail replies as follows: "Capt. Read is not to be taken seriously. It is true the price of potatoes in this market is very high and it may likewise be true that many bushels of tubers are going to rot in the cellars of farmers both on the island and on the mainland, but that is no excuse for waste and extravagance."

SUPREME COURT.—The Eastern Term of the Supreme Court opened in Charlottetown yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and Mr. Justice Hazzard on the bench. Owing to the absence, through illness of Chief Justice Matheson, all arguments set down for hearing were deferred to the next term of the Court. A number of judgments were delivered in the case of Fanning vs. Watts, in which a verdict had been given for the plaintiff for \$300, an application for a new trial was refused. A new trial was granted in the case of Alexander McNeill, Shepherd, Allen and Albert C. Saunders vs. the Guinac Silver Black Box Co., in which judgment of nonsuit had previously been given. A new trial was also ordered in the case of Lowther vs. Allan, the defendant having gained the verdict at the trial. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald delivered judgment in the double case, heard before him in the Chancery Court of W. J. Vincent vs. Alice Madore and Alice Madore vs. W. J. Vincent, concerning the title of certain property. He found for complainant, Vincent. Court then adjourned sine die.

CLEAN YOUR CHIMNEY NOW

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KNEW GERMAN AND TRAPP. ED NINE OF ENEMY LONDON, May 6.—How his knowledge of German earned the Military Cross for Lieutenant Folsa Eric Sevire of Welland, is related in the Official Gazette as follows: Lieutenant Sevire was advancing with a scout patrol when he encountered nine Boche soldiers and challenged them in their own language, receiving the reply that they were infantry relief men. He ordered them to advance, until he got them under Lewis gun fire and then demanded their surrender. When they refused to surrender Sevire fired and personally killed the leader of the enemy party, two others being killed and five captured. Lieut. Sevire is aged twenty-three years and has been in France for eighteen months. Four Canadian chaplains have also received the Military Cross for attending wounded men under fire.
