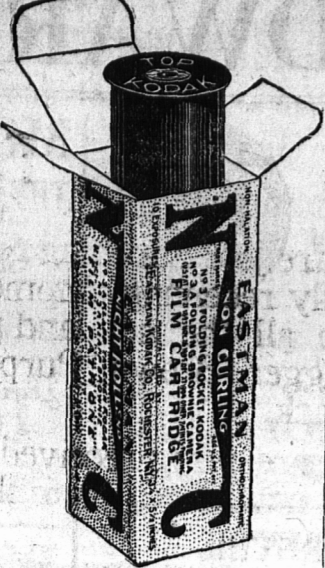

WORLD'S TROTTER RECORD SET—At Syracuse, N. Y., the other day Lee Axworthy, the world's champion trotting stallion, lowered his own record by negotiating a mile in two minutes flat. Paced by two running horses the son of Guy Axworthy never faltered during the race. In fact, trotting each of the four quarters in exactly thirty seconds. Axworthy's former record was 2:00 1/4. Under perfect weather and track conditions his driver, Ben White, essayed to break the track record of 2:01 1/4 held by the late T. T. Trotter, and in also shattering the world's record will go down in history as one of the greatest achievements of the sport.
