LIVESTOCK MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., June 9.—There were 121 cattle, 681 hogs, 62 calves

and 129 sheep and lambs for sale on the two livestock markets today. Seventy cars of cattle were received at the yards and twenty-seven cars were reported for export to Great Britain, leaving the port of Montreal on Thursday, June 11th on the Manchester producer and the Salacia. The cattle market was about steady. Fairly good fleshy cows sold up to \$4 and just medium kinds around \$3.50. Yesterday's sales, good butcher bulls were mostly weighed up at \$4. Today's sales.—Common bulls brought from \$2.50 to \$3.50. One lot of 52 medium to good quality calves averaging 120 pounds, brought \$5.50 and common to just plain veals from \$4 to \$4.50. Common drinkers sold as low as \$2.50, with the bulk between \$3 and \$3.25.

Sheep were mostly \$3.50 and spring lambs from \$12 to \$12.50 per cwt., with one small lot of good lambs averaging close to 70 pounds, registered \$13. Common light lambs were not wanted and sold as low as \$10. Hogs were steady at \$8.75 to \$9 for bacon, butchers and lights. Heavies ranged from \$7 to \$7.75 and sows were mostly \$5.50 to \$6.

Pastry "Musts"

(1) Mix quickly and roll lightly: a heavy hand makes heavy pastry.

(2) Use just enough liquid to hold the mixture together: a soft dough means tough crust.

(3) Chill ingredients and mixing bowl; chill dough before baking: If the fat melts the crust is soggy.

(4) Bake pastry at 425 degrees—reduce slightly after 10 or 15 minutes—a slow oven soaks fat into the crust and makes it leathery.

(5) Fold the dough: this encloses air and makes the pastry light and flaky.

(6) Never grease pie plates; there is enough grease in the pastry to prevent sticking; extra fat makes a poor crust.
