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WHEN BIRDS GET SORE FEET

Ducks as well as hens are liable to get bruised or cut feet, causing considerable pain and lameness and occasionally death. In cases of injury and swelling or festering lance the swelling by making a rather wide incision with a sharp knife. Drain the wound and wash it with iodine and then bandage. Several dressings may be necessary before healing takes place. Such cases in birds greatly differ. Some may be easy to heal, while others result in lameness and great loss of vigor. Your own inspection of the bird can best determine whether it is worth trying to save through surgery.

Horses even are more susceptible than sheep to injury from muddy feed. For the reason therefore, that even in the best of silage pockets of mould may develop. It cannot be considered a safe feed for horses. Roots are valuable for toning up the digestive system of horses, and silage, could it be soundness be relied upon, might be used in place of roots for this purpose. Until fuller knowledge is gained, however, the control of mould in silage is perhaps best considered as an unsuitable feed for horses.

Picture Settings Most Gorgeous

Artistic Background for "Black Oxen" One of the Triumphant of Motion Picture Art

One of the most important branches of the cinema's pictorial work is that of those mute, immovable impressionists—the backgrounders, the settings.

It might be possible to say that the demands of the screen have brought about a greater improvement in architecture and interior decorating the past five years than was known the previous fifty, and legitimately so, for the buildings and interiors of the screen are seen daily by 20,000,000 people of many different nationalities and tastes, and furthermore, because the movies are such an influence in our modern life, the details of their production must be the most carefully and accurately handled.

In "Black Oxen," which Frank Lloyd has made into a First National picture, with Corinne Griffith and Conway Tearle in the leading roles, the interior settings are the most gorgeous seen on the silver sheet in some time. The nature of the story requires a dignified, artistic background for nearly each sequence, and because most of the action transpires within New York homes, even though old architectural lines were followed, it was necessary for each set to have certain modern treatment.

The architecture of the interior of the Ogden (Zattiany) home follows the periods of the Italian Renaissance and of Louis XV., with draperies and other furnishings in harmony. The Ogdenhome home settings are, for the most part, patterned after the Wron period of designs. The Austrian court scenes are of an ancient Austrian origin. Clavering's rooms and those of Donnie Ferren are of typical modern design. The Ogden stair hall is of the period of Louis XV.

Decorating, like architecture, has much to do with the success of any truly big production. Robert Little, Frank Lloyd's decorator, makes four trips to New York and one to Europe each year, to study latest decorative creations. Like Stephen Goossens, Mr. Lloyd's architect, Mr. Little's art training was obtained in the leading academies of Europe, and he has been responsible for the interior decorations of many of the biggest photographic productions made.

Mr. Little chose, as the color scheme for Mary Ogden's boudoir set, pale lavender. The color scheme for Janet's boudoir was pale lavender and pale green.

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
