A SPLENDID TEAM—In the report of the pulling contest at the Provincial Horse Show in Wednesday's issue it would appear as though the classes for teams were for those that pulled 3,000 lbs and over and those that pulled under 3,000 lbs when the weight referred only to the weight of the teams themselves there being two classes, one for teams weighing 3,000 lbs and over and one for teams weighing under 3,000 lbs. The results show that the team having the greater pulling power was found in the lighter class, that for teams weighing under 3,000 lbs and exhibited by Mr. A. A. McBeath, Marshfield. They were also shown single in the grade draft class, in one of the strongest classes that appeared at the show and were placed first and second respectively, which was evidence of the ability of the judge in picking the winner as they upheld his judgment when it came to the actual test. This team which was much admired throughout the show is composed of mother and daughter, the older mare having competed eight times, each in strong classes and winning first in each of the eight. This is the younger mare's first appearance in the show ring and she gave the older one a run for the money. She is sired by the pure bred Clydesdale stallion "Lord Winsloe."

Rotary Club Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Rotary Club was held last night at the Kignoo, with the President, Mr. W. M. Rowe in the chair. The guests present were Major Keith Rogers, Mr. J. K. Ross, and Dr. Green.

Major Rogers spoke on the subject of radio broadcasting and the work being done here alone that line by Mr. W. E. Burke. He stressed the need of a Charlottetown broadcasting station with more powerful apparatus, from which great results could be hoped for, and he made a strong plea for popular support of the idea when it should be brought up.

Herriot Defends Religious Policy

PARIS, April 2.—Premier Herriot upheld the Government's religious policy in Alsace in the Chamber of Deputies debate this afternoon as a logical effort to unify the recovered provinces with France by gradually bringing them under the same laws.

The premier defended himself against the Alsatian charges of religious persecution, saying: "When it is said my Government has lighted a conflagration in this country, I have the right to reply it is a lie."

Alsace, he added, "ought to be made to live under the same laws as those under which all Frenchmen live."

Northern Ireland

BELFAST, April 2.—The balance sheet of the government of Northern Ireland for the year shows a surplus of revenue over expenditure of £150,000. The figures on the surplus for the previous year of Ulster's existence as a separate state were £47,000, £32,000 and £46,000, respectively.

way of commodities. The C. N. R. would transport these free and not only would the people of Nova Scotia be thus helped but the situation would also be relieved. In regard to clothing, the speaker thought it would be advisable to organize a department to collect used clothing.

Mr. Trainor referred to the appeal made to the railroad telegraphers of the Island and neighboring provinces. These had responded to the limit of their ability. He agreed with the previous speaker that it was best to buy produce, such as potatoes, butter, and eggs here.

All through Canada the people were rising splendidly to the occasion; the city of Winnipeg had sent \$21,000 to relieve the distress.

He had recently received a letter from Mr. Bert Brown, York, saying that the situation had been discussed at a church meeting there and the people of that district were only waiting for a move in Charlottetown before acting. The speaker didn't think there was any question as to the extreme need of the miners' families. Independent men had gone down to see for themselves and these said that on all sides there was great distress and hardships. The relief committee had not sufficient funds with which to work and on occasion were only able to issue daily food allowances to the value of 9 cents to each individual. The representatives of the St. Lawrence miners, were assured that everything possible would be done to launch a campaign for relief subscriptions.

moirah of a deep bluish gray tone which provides restful comfort to the eyes of the passengers. The inside door handles, automatic window lifts and other interior metal appointments are finished in dull silver. The coupe body is mounted on the seven passenger chassis to meet the demand for the utmost comfort, power and speed. All the standard equipment of the Studebaker models is built in the coupe. The car is finished in Belgian blue lacqueroid finish.

The bodies of the Studebaker models are all built by Studebaker at their own body-building plant, and the utmost ingenuity of the designers and engineers has gone into the production of the 1925 models.

The Chevrolet Exhibits

On the right hand side of the showroom the Chevrolet models are in position. Leaving the Studebakers the visitor is first shown

The Chevrolet Chassis

Here is given an opportunity to view at close range the many new parts of the Chevrolet which have been introduced. The overhead valves and rocker arms are completely enclosed to protect them from grease and dirt. The crankshaft is four pounds heavier and is made of high carbon steel. It is mounted on three main bearings, with a larger and longer center main bearing. The flywheel is completely enclosed. Underparts protect the motor from grease and dirt under all road conditions. The intake manifold has been shortened and the carburetor has been raised twelve inches so that it is in line with the cylinder head. The result is an even fuel distribution to all cylinders. There is also a new disc clutch, practically fool-proof and the clutch and transmission are housed from dirt. The rear axle is banjo-type, one piece pressed steel housing. There are semi-elliptic springs and the gas tank is in the rear and is worked on the vacuum system. The bodies are built by Fisher and balloon tires are standard on all closed models.

The Touring Car

The Chevrolet Touring model embodies new quality features which would only be expected in cars of much higher price. It has a longer and stronger frame and the seats are adjusted to give the maximum of riding comfort. The body is finished in Duco of a rich dark blue shade which retains its color and lustre almost indefinitely. The car is equipped with cowl lamps, windshield with rubber weatherstrip, demountable rims, extra rim, tire carrier, speedometer ammeter, oil gauge and other modern accessories.

The Roadster

The roadster is an unusually attractive type of car. Like the touring model, the roadster has heavy, durable upholstery over deep coil springs and the body is finished in dark blue Duco. The honeycomb radiator has a shell with nickel finish. Cowl lights are standard equipment and the instrument board contains a panel type ammeter and oil gauge, speedometer, dash lamp and choke. The dash is designed for maximum leg-room. Many other accessories combine to make this car assume the appearance of a sport roadster. The cost of maintenance has been reduced to a minimum.

The Coupe

The handsome Fisher body of the Chevrolet Sedan is finished in harmonious colors. The lower panels and hood are in aquamarine blue with the upper panels in deep blue. The interior is finished in fine quality rich velours and the deep cushion-sprung seats have been redesigned for increased comfort. It is equipped with the new one-piece VV type windshield. An automatic windshield wiper is also provided. Standard equipment calls for sturdy artillery wheels with cord tires but disc wheels and balloon tires may be had.

The Coach

The Chevrolet closed car is one of the greatest cars of its type on the market. It has the new VV one-piece windshield with automatic wiper. Wide seats to which access is given by extra wide doors, provide ample seating capacity for five passengers. All side windows are easily lowered or raised with Turnsted regulators. The windshield is also equipped with the regulator and a full supply of fresh air is always obtainable.

The excellence of the Chevrolet exhibit created considerable discussion last evening.

Mr. Morrison of the Studebaker Company and Mr. Dryden of the Chevrolet Company are in town for the show. Messrs. A. Horne and Company in whose building the show was held have been in business since 1870, before Confederation was introduced, and the reputation they have built up has become well known all over Prince Edward Island and in many parts of the Dominion.
