CHTOWN BOYS MAKE SPLENDID SHOWING

At Interscholastic Meet in Moncton and Returned Home Yesterday.

The second annual Maritime Interscholastic Meet held last Saturday in Moncton was won by West Kent School, and one of its entrants, Fred Holl, carried off the all round championship, winning twenty-one of West Kent's fifty-five points. Although the Charlottetown school went into first place almost with the first event, it had to fight hard to maintain its lead, and finished only four and a half points ahead of its nearest rival, Moncton Aberdeen High School. Queen Square was also a close contender for premier honors, winning forty three points, and Arthur Gormley being second highest point winner with a mark of eighteen. Percy Cameron of West Kent was third with seventeen points, and Addy of Aberdeen High fourth with fifteen points.

New interscholastic records were made by Holl in the pole vault, Hornby in the half mile run, and Duffy in the intermediate running high jump. Ninety-eight of the total 153 points were won by the island schools.

On the whole the meet was very successful and the competition keener than the year before at New Glasgow. The Charlottetown boys, who returned home yesterday, were extremely pleased at the treatment they received, and good sportsmanship, was evident throughout the meet.

Speaking of the championships the Moncton Times said that Holl, the winner of the all round medal, deserved much credit for his showing. Although only fifteen and therefore in the intermediate class, Holl won a first, a second and a third in the senior classes. His work in the pole vault was exceptionally fine, and his style was the subject of praise from all sides.

The credit for the splendid showing made by the Charlottetown schools goes in large measure to those who trained the athletes, namely Messrs Lou Campbell, William Halpenney, and George Walker.
