Miners Strike At New Waterford, N. S.

NEW WATERFORD, N. S., May 16.—(CP)—Union officials disclaimed responsibility tonight for a strike of members of the United Mine Workers of America who threw Dominion Coal Company's no. 12 colliery into idleness because some miners were refused re-employment after serving jail sentences. As 1,100 miners remained idle because of the walkout, President Richard Burns of the Union's no. 12 local declared it had not been called either by the local or district executive. The miners left the pit today, he said, without authorization from the U. M. W. District President D. W. Morrison, N. S., tonight the union had "no connection" with the strike. The district executive was doing nothing about the New Waterford Miners' complaint pending their return to work, President Morrison declared.

Qualification of Voters

For Councillor

1. Every voter must be a person male or female of the age of twenty-one years, a British subject and not subject to any legal incapacity, and such voter, or her husband, or his wife must own real estate of a freehold or leasehold tenure or partly freehold and partly leasehold of the value of \$325 and must have owned or been in possession of the same period of at least six months previous to the date of the writ of election.

2. Returned soldiers, being British subjects, including Minors or Indians, who have been on active service without Canada during the Great War, provided they have resided in the electoral district in which they seek to vote for at least twelve months previous to the date of the writ of election.

3. Clergymen residing in the Province in actual charge of a parish in the electoral district.

For Assemblyman

1. Every voter must be a person male or female, of the age of twenty-one years, a British subject and not subject to any legal incapacity and must in addition be entitled to one of the following qualifications:

(a) Must have resided in the province at least 12 months and in the electoral district in which he seeks to vote at least 2 months immediately preceding the issue of the writ of election.

(b) Ownership in self, or husband or wife, for 6 months previous to the date of the writ of election, of freehold property to the value of not less than \$100, consisting of a warehouse, shop, or other building, or any farm or any piece of land, or must be in the bona fide use and occupation or actual possession of any such last mentioned premises.

2. Any one who is otherwise qualified to vote at the election of a councillor.

Other Provisions

1. Occasional absences from the Province for any period or periods not exceeding in all four months in the year preceding the writ of election, shall not disqualify such persons from voting, provided they have resided in the electoral district in which they claim to vote for two months previous to date of the election.

2. The time spent as a mariner or fisherman, or student, shall be considered as having been spent in the electoral district in which his residence would have been except for such absence.

3. Joint tenants, tenants in common, etc. may vote where each individual is of the value of \$100.

4. No mortgagee or trustee may vote unless in actual occupation of the property mortgaged or held in trust.
