A PARDON "IN PRINCIPLE."

When it was cabled across the Atlantic that President Loubet and his Council of Ministers had decided "to pardon Dreyfus in principle," there was naturally some curiosity to know what the qualifying words might mean. An exchange tells us:

"In principle" is an idiom sometimes used in semi-official announcements of forthcoming action. It seems to have but slight bearing on the matter, except, perhaps, that it implies the fulfillment of various formalities before the pardon is actually issued, thereby qualifying the announcement of the pardon with slight tentativeness. It is not known yet whether the pardon includes amnesty.

What appears to be the fact is that the pardon is conditioned upon certain things that Dreyfus will be required to do. One of these was the rather hard condition that he should withdraw his appeal to the Court of Cassation. Having been found guilty by the Court Martial, the prisoner naturally hoped that by appeal to the higher court he might have been acquitted. As it is now he stands before the world, not as an innocent man, but as one adjudged guilty. An innocent man cannot willingly accept a pardon instead of an acquittal.

Other conditions of the pardon are supposed to have to do with the future of Dreyfus, possibly where he shall reside. He seems to have accepted the conditions, whatever they are, as the price of his liberation. After all the hardship and cruelties he has suffered we can hardly wonder that he has accepted "the pardon in principle." He can the more easily do so now that he knows a very large portion of the civilized world believes him really innocent.

Hon. J. I. Tarte has arrived home with his family. An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Herald says: "His health is not very good." An Ottawa despatch to the Chronicle says: "The Minister is in good health."

Probably every one thought that Kipling's "Lady of the Snows" was a compliment to Canada, though some criticised it severely. Mr. Kipling in his prose writings has also taken occasion to mention the Dominion with favor. He says:

"It is a great country; a country with a future. There is a fine hard, bracing climate, the climate that puts iron and grit into men's bones and there are all good things to be got out of the ground if people will work for them. What it wants is more men and more money. Why don't Englishmen think more of it as a field for English capital and enterprise? Surely there is an excellent opening both for the investing and emigrating Briton there. Things don't, perhaps, move quite so fast as in the United States, but they are safer, and you are under the flag you know, and among men of the same stock and breed. Send your folks to Canada; and if they can't go themselves, let them send their money—plenty of it."
