—Commissioner Wakeham held a very interesting meeting in Summerside yesterday. There were about 50 of the leading lobster packers present from the eastern half of Prince Co. About 20 of those came forward and gave voluntary sworn evidence of the conditions of the lobster industry as it occurred to them from their experience and observations. Although there were some differences in the opinion expressed by them as to the days of opening and closing of the lobster season along their different points on the shore. Yet much valuable information was brought out which no doubt will be helpful for future use in regulating the lobster industry. Commissioner Wakeham's long list of questions, which he placed before each of the witnesses, were all practical and showed clearly that he is deeply interested in the work of improving the situation if possible, and of doing all that can be done to assist the packers and fishermen in this important industry. The question of lobster hatcheries was discussed to some extent and the packers were unanimous in their opinion that this would increase the number of fish and would be of great advantage. There was very little brought on in the evidences to show that the law regulating lobster fishing has been violated. The meeting was considered a very profitable one.
