It will not be sold but will be published at the Company's expense and mailed free. will dissolve it, and boil it to a sugar again. Then add the raspberries and the juice, give them a scalding, and pour into glasses or plates. Put them on to stone to dry, turn them when necessary and store away for use. CURRANTIZED FRUITS 1 gill spring water. 1 lb. clear sugar. Whites of 2 eggs. Fruit. Currants, cherries, grapes, plums and raspberries can be crystallized as well as many other fruits in this way. See first the fruit is very perfect. Well beat the whites of the eggs, and mix them with the spring water, and dip fruit separately into the egg and water mixture, then roll them in the pounded sugar. Roll them several times, then turn them out on white paper to dry till they become crystallized. Arrange on a dish in green leaves when serving. SHRUB Take one gallon and a pint of brandy, one quart of lemon and orange juice, two pounds of the finest loaf sugar, take the peel of six oranges and six oranges (I presume lemons are meant) steep them 24 hours in some of the brandy. Strain off the lemon and orange juice, then put all together in the cask or bottle, shaking it twice a day, for a fortnight, then let it settle and bottle it off. When you wish to drink the punch allow 1/2 pint of water to a gill of the shrub.

DESSERT ISLAND (Copied by Queen Victoria. Date 1835, Kensington Palace.) Make a lump of paste into a rock three inches broad at the top. Colour it to taste and put it in the centre of a deep china dish. Get a cast figure on it with a crown on the head and a knot of rock candy at the feet. Then make a roll of paste an inch thick, stick it on the inner edge of the dish, all the way round. Cut 8 pieces of eringe root, about 3 inches long, and fix them upright upon the roll of paste on the edge. Make gravel walks of confts round the dish. Set small figures in them and roll out the paste. Cut it open like Chinese nails, and bake it. Fix it on either side of the gravel walks with gum. Form an entrance where the rails are with 2 pieces of eringe roots for Pillars. NOTE.—Think eringe must mean angela.

RASPBERRY PASTE (Copied by Queen Victoria at Kensington Palace in 1835 from an old recipe.) Bruise a quart of ripe raspberries and strain one half and put the juice obtained to the other half, and boil for 15 minutes. Add a pint of red currant juice, and boil together till raspberries are cooked. Then put 1 lb. refined sugar into a clean pan with as much spring water as

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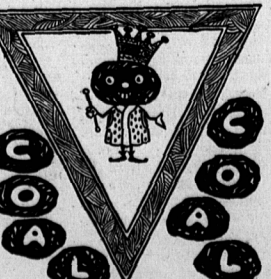
