THE recent visit of the French cruiser Ialy and the courtesies interchanged with the Governor, American Consul and others has served to recall the times, away back in the eighties, when the Democrats were in power in Washington and Col. G. was Consul in Charlottetown. The Colonel was a famous character in this city in those days, and once, when he was waited upon by our then accomplished Mayor nearly took His Worship's breath away by inquiring "Kin you write?" But this by the way. A French man of war had come into port and something had to be done. Col. G. concluded to go on board and managed to send word to the ship that he desired to do so, coupled with the intimation that he had no boat. "Tell 'em to send the long-boat and I'll go on board," he said. So presently a boat was sent with a party of marines and a little Tri-color at her bow or stern as the case may be. Now Col. G. if he had no boat was in possession of a large flag on which the Stars and Stripes, were emblazoned, and as this was typical of the greatness and grandeur of his country he took it with him. Arrived at the wharf he presented himself and his flag before the crew of the boat who looked their unutterable astonishment. They said nothing however, and Col. G.'s knowledge of the French language was limited. So he embarked, and the boy whom he had employed as an attendant went with him, holding aloft the spangled banner of Liberty. In its presence the little low-flying Tricolor looked very insignificant. The boat had barely put off from the wharf when she was observed from the ship and immediately there was excitement on board. Was the Consul coming to demand the surrender of the ship? The audacious, insulting man! They did not see the humorous side of it all. And as for Col. G. he was quite sublimely unconscious of doing other than the correct thing. But when he reached the ship's side he became conscious that something was wrong. He was met with angry looks and some angry ejaculations in French, which he did not understand, and some in bad English which he did. He hastened to explain as best he might. "I did not know any better," he explained "and the Democratic party's been out so long that even if I'd inquired at Washington perhaps they could not have told me." So the international difficulty which had so suddenly arisen was quietly arranged and when Col. G. took his departure from the ship the Stars and Stripes were duly honored with booming guns and the smoke of powder.
